Food For Thought

Sometime in the past, many of us took a membership vow within the United Methodist Church. By taking the baptismal and local church membership vows, the individual agrees to covenant with God and the members of the local church to keep the vows that are part of living the baptismal covenant and reception into membership in the local church. These vows have four parts: (1) to confess Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior; (2) to believe in the Christian faith as contained in the Old and New Testaments; (3) to support The United Methodist Church; and (4) to uphold the local congregation with one's prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. The first two parts are included among the baptismal vows. Those and the latter two parts are included in the vows when becoming a professing member in a local United Methodist congregation.

How are we doing?

Our intercession on behalf of others often results in our prayers being answered. In either case, God's will is being done.

With 200+ members, it appears that we are missing many for weekly community worship. Possibly we are not working hard enough to bring them back into the fold. What can we do to encourage them to return?

Our gifts, which are used to help us make disciples of Jesus Christ, are often given with stipulations. This limits the ability of the congregation to apply those gifts for what is most important at the moment. While Jesus may have suggested that giving up all worldly goods and following him is beneficial, most of us are unwilling to rely upon our preaching skills and benevolence of others for sustenance. But, while most of us have heard of the concept of tithing, few actually do so. My suggestion is that we should consider tithing while giving to our general budget (keeping the doors open, and only giving amounts above the tithe to reserved accounts (often referred to as designated accounts – those items not included within the general budget). Doing both helps the church in its general mission and permits us to support those additional programs we want to see implemented.

Are you involved in committees and groups within the congregation? Have you taken training in our Youth and Child Protection Policy which enables you to assist in their programs? Do you serve with the Food Pantry, Hope House, choir, praise team, audio/visual team, committees, etc.? Our obligation goes beyond merely attending church services. We are to be servants as well.

For some of us, witness is the hardest part. Do you witness to those outside our congregation? Does your behavior always exhibit what we believe a Christian should convey? We're not necessarily talking of taking booklets from door-to-door, but do you always provide an appropriate example to those around you? Do you invite those without a church family to visit with us?

The above are all "food for thought".

Florida United Methodist Children's Home (FUMCH) Christmas Gift Card Drive

Ever see the smiles on children's faces when the Christmas season rolls around? It's a joy to behold. When we first came to Lake Gibson UMC, we were asked around Christmastime to consider purchasing gifts for either boys or girls within certain age groups. Unfortunately, there was no match to a particular child. We never knew if the gift was appropriate (right size, color, style, etc.).

Over the past four years FUMCH has asked that we provide gift cards. The intent is to provide approximately \$150 in value for each child. House parents use a portion to purchase appropriate gifts to be wrapped and placed under their cottage's Christmas tree. The remainder is available to the children for shopping sprees where they select their own gifts. Additionally, some gift cards are used to take the cottage's children to celebration meals off campus. If excess cards are provided, they are used to purchase needed items for the children throughout the year.

It is most helpful for gift cards to be in increments of \$10 to \$100 to major chain stores and restaurants. Especially useful and flexible gift cards for children include Amazon, Visa, Kohl's, Wal-Mart, Epic Theater, and GameStop gift cards. Popular restaurants our staff like to treat the children to over Christmas break include Darden Brands (Olive Garden, Longhorn Steakhouse & Cheddar's Scratch Kitchen), Papa John's Pizza, Applebee's, and Chili's restaurants.

Once again, we ask that donated cards be placed within an envelope or bundled together with your name included. These gifts will be considered as "designated contributions" for accounting purposes. Either deliver them to the office or place them in the offering plates on Sunday. Please include a gift card receipt and write the denomination on each gift card. Should you desire to give either cash or check, we ask that you annotate "FUMCH Gift Card Drive" with your donation. We will convert these to the appropriate gift cards. In order to distribute cards and make purchases, we have been asked to have all cards delivered to FUMCH before 1 December. We envision delivering them on Monday, 4 December to the Enterprise campus. This will provide time for distribution to cottage house parents for purchase and wrapping of appropriate gifts. Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the *Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events.

Wealth versus Income

We often consider these to be one-in-the-same. Actually, they are not. Our wealth comes from savings, investments (401-k, IRAs), homes, belongings, etc. Alternatively, our income arises from those items which bring in repetitive funds, such as salaries, social security payments, and retirement stipends.

In most cases, our wealth is used for major, one-time acquisitions or actions. It may be spent during our lifetime and bequeathed to others through trusts and wills upon death. Our excess income may be added to wealth over time.

Our recurring income is generally spent on our daily purchases (food, shelter, etc.) and stops upon our passing.

You've heard the saying "you can't take it with you". But, you can certainly plan for what happens to your wealth in the future. Wills and trusts ensure that your desires are carried out. If you don't have either instrument, consider making the time to specify your wishes. You can't do it after-the-fact.

Consider including your family, relatives, and church in your plans. You might find that you have significant wealth which should be allocated. Best to figure it out while you have a say in what will happen!.
