From the Pastor's Desk

While writing this I am smelling the aroma of a very good spaghetti sauce simmering on the stove, and at the same time I am thinking about what makes a good church? It occurs to me that good churches and good spaghetti sauces may share some similarities (I'm sure the ladies are saying only a man can think this way -- through his stomach). Let's discuss this thought a little bit.

Spaghetti sauces start with a few basics; in my family, two: a good tomato sauce and good meat. A good church is founded on basics also, the blood of Christ shed for the forgiveness of sin and the lamb sacrificed on the cross (sauce and meat). Those ingredients are a must and they are foundational, but to create a great sauce or a great church there are other things that must be included.

In a sauce we may add water – the water of baptism for the church. Some like to add onion – onions can make us cry. A good church will have some sorrowful moments in it that may bring tears to our eyes. Most good sauces will have salt and pepper for some seasoning, just as the church is to be the salt of the earth seeking to flavor and preserve the good here in our society.

Most good sauces are going to have many other ingredients in them like basil, chives, bell pepper, mushrooms, sugar, baking soda, garlic, fresh herbs and more. The same way a good church has many different kinds of people in it: white, black, brown, yellow; white-collar, blue-collar, mangers, laborers, professional, laity, those educated in school, those educated by hard knocks, rich, poor and in between. Now just throwing all these ingredients into the pot doesn't make a good sauce – they have to simmer together.

Likewise, a church has to have people who are willing to walk through life together and help one another in hard times as well as rejoice in good times. Time and life experiences are what simmer us and bring us together as one. The Holy Spirit provides the heat to simmer us all together in the "melding pot" for it is only as we meld together that we become a good, or prayerfully, a great church.

Like in a good sauce, when you taste it your mouth waters with all the flavors of the various ingredients, a good church appeals to a broad spectrum of people because there is something there that compels people to join together. This is the "love of God" manifest in the body of Christ. One of the terms we use here at Lake Gibson UMC to describe this process is "love in action": God working through our members to help those in our community and around the world.

Many people may say the preacher is an important part of a good church, but like Italian sausage added to a hamburger base of a good sauce, the extra flavor is nice, but not necessary for nutrition. A sauce

is not made to be eaten by itself. It is poured over something and we normally put it over spaghetti or some sort of starchy base. Yes, you can add it to meats, rice and other things too, but commonly it is served over pasta of some sort.

A good church is served over the noodles of everyday life. The church, the pastor, the congregation, the programs and the facility all work together to help the people of the community deal with life.

Like children who say spaghetti reminds them of worms, life gives us worms at times and it is a good church that helps society and individuals cope with bad things. A good church also helps us to put things in perspective when they are going well, so no one thinks they are the tomato or hamburger of the church. A good church reminds us that God provided the basics through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and God also graciously gives us the extras to enjoy this life.

So, is Lake Gibson UMC a good church? The basics are here, many of the extras are present, and we are still simmering. The aroma is beginning to waft into the community and others are coming to check us out.

The question I ask you this month as I close is this: Are you a part of the church willing to do your part to make us a good – perhaps even a great – church, or are you still on the shelf of life? Let God use you to spice up your life and the lives of others through your service to the church.



Just a Phone Call

As a new volunteer Phone Pal for VISTE (Volunteers in Service to the Elderly), I was given a list of names and phone numbers of several elderly clients who needed assistance and usually live alone. The list included their birthdates and a comment column. Other than their birthdate, I knew nothing else about them.

Phone Pals are volunteers who call the persons on the list each week to check in with a reassurance call to see if they are okay or need any help that VISTE services can provide. These services include transportation to a doctor's office and other destinations, home delivery for supplemental grocery supplies, prepared meals and minor home repairs.

When I began making the calls, I simply introduced myself, explained I was with VISTE and the purpose of my call. Most of the clients would reply to my questions for them with a simple "I'm okay" or "No, I don't need anything" and the conversation ended with "Thank you for calling".

At first I made the calls, asked the questions to see how they were doing and ended the call with "It was nice talking to you. Have a nice day and I'll call you next week." I then wrote in the comment column by following the example sheet given to me: Fine, OK or No need or request at this time.

For a while this routine went well. It only took a short time to make the calls and write the comments in the blank spaces. After a while I begin to review my short comments of "Fine, OK and No needs or request" and realized these were elderly, home-bound people that live alone and needed someone to talk to, and most of them had little or no family, or no one living nearby.

It wasn't easy to get some of them engaged in a general conversation; after all, I was a stranger to them, but others warmed up quickly. Little by little, each week I was able to extend our conversations by asking how their day was going and little things about themselves. After we hung up the phone, I made notes pertaining to the things they talked about. This made it easier to open the conversation the next week.

The subject could be on anything: the weather, gardening, flowers, politics, church, their faith, family, health issues, latest news on TV or the radio, reminiscing about the past or whatever came up, but I let them open the subject, then listened and chatted with them. Sometimes they would remember something funny that happened in their younger years that would make them laugh, which is something they probably didn't do often. They were eager and happy to have someone to talk to.

There were several clients (Phone Pals) that I had to make contact with, so I had to limit the time I spent with each one, but that time meant so much, and to have someone remember the little things we talked about meant the world to them. Living alone or being home-bound can be lonely and make the days and weeks long and sad. God knew this in the beginning and gave Adam his mate Eve. Genesis 2:18-25 If you have a loved one or know someone who lives alone, a shut-in, or a care-giver who can't leave home, give them a call and brighten their day. It only takes a moment to spread a little love and kindness to cheer up someone.

Church Finances

This month we're reporting on where we stand with church finances through the end of July (we're always two months behind the newsletter's date due to the lead time involved in publication of *The Good News*). Rather than provide charts with percentages as we have been doing, I'll just reflect the basic numbers and their implication.

The 2015 core budget was approved at **\$321,952**. As a reminder, during 2015, the Lake Gibson United Methodist Church Administrative Council chose to set aside the first 10% of most contributions (envelopes/pledges/tithes, loose plate offerings, and Sunday School collections) to be used specifically for mission, outreach, and evangelism (up to \$27,000). The remaining 90% would then be available to support other aspects of church operations.

Our commitment to give the first 10% to mission/outreach/evangelism has significant implications for our church budget. With members in 131 family units, we are attempting to raise almost \$322,000 during 2015. Through the end of July, we have received \$165,189, or approximately 51.3% of our budgeted revenue.

Based on a straight-line projection, after 7 months we should be at 58.3%, reflecting a deficit of 7%, or \$22,540.

Is our support of the Kingdom of God any less important than the support we give to secular endeavors? Please look at what your family has financially contributed and plans to contribute the rest of this year to the objectives of LGUMC to insure that we are able to continue our ministry for years to come.

We are taught to give generously with the anticipation of spiritual rewards, not monetary. Jesus instructed followers to focus on spiritual rewards, citing His command in Matthew 6:19–20, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth . . . But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven." (KJV).

Most of us have accepted that there is a place for government, whether it be local, state, or Federal. Happily or begrudgingly, as members of society, we contribute through such acts as voting, jury duty, and paying property and income taxes. In fact, the lowest Federal tax rate is 10%, with the highest set at 39.6%.

As church members, we promised to be faithful in "our witness" as well as in "our prayers, our presence, our gifts and our service." This is not an either/or proposition. We are asked to provide our church with our efforts in <u>all</u> these areas.

This past year I was asked about my definition of tithing during a Finance Committee meeting. I mentioned that my definition of tithing was contributing 10% of our gross (total) income to the church, not a portion of what is left after subtracting taxes, deductions, etc. While tithing might be considered an Old Testament concept, providing financial gifts to the church is essential to spreading the Word. While there is a certain separation of church and state, church members must insure that the work of the church

continues. Unlike some countries, the American church is not state supported, and must rely upon its members. We don't garnish pay. We rely upon the willingness of our church family to provide this financial support to further the Lord's work on earth.

A Guide to Apportionments:

Where Does the Money Go and How Is It Spent?

As your lay delegate to the annual conference I would like to share information about apportionments. Apportionments fund the programs and activities approved by delegates from your church. Your church's apportionment is your church's fair share of the costs of these programs and activities. Your apportionment is important! Your church's giving makes a difference. Last month we talked about Clergy Support. This month I would like to tell you about:

NEW CHURCH STARTS

This apportionment helps underwrite the cost of starting new churches in the Florida Conference. To increase our rate of making disciples in an increasing population, the Florida Conference must continue to start new churches and missions to reach people of all ages, races and nationalities. The Florida Conference leads the United Methodist Church in America in new church starts and missions.

The Conference Committee on New Church Development works with the Cabinet and the District Committees on New Church Development to target communities for new churches and missions. Each district is represented on the Committee through its chair (or their representative) of the District Committee on New Church Development. The *MissionInsite* demographic database is used to help locate areas in which new congregations are needed.

This apportionment provides funding for new church starts in each District as follows:

- A traditional church start ("parachute drop").
- For new starts that are "Mother/Daughter" (churches starting other churches) and multi-site (establishing a second campus).
- Each new mission in a district.

This committee also provides training, coaching and mentoring for pastors who have demonstrated and been tested to have the gifts needed to start a new congregation.

The administrative expenses for this committee are funded through interest earnings on loans for first units to new churches and not through apportionments.

The 2016 budget for this apportionment can be found by going to <u>flumc.org</u>, click on ac2015, click on workbook and go to page 125.

Some of the ways your money was spent in 2014 were:

- Seven pre-chartered new starts met their benchmarks and continued to receive funding.
- · Twenty mission churches received support.

- Three new starts are planned for 2015.
- Two pre-chartered churches were selected for funding under a new program to provide support for churches on the cusp of chartering who need specialized staff to energize growth.
- New Church Start Academy was begun.

Remembering Mother Teresa

Eighteen years ago, on September 5, 1997, Mother Teresa of Calcutta died. On October 19th, 2003, Pope John Paul II pronounced her a Saint of the Roman Catholic Church, the culmination of actions started only 2 years after her death. Who was the tiny woman who had such an impact on people around the world during her 87 years?

The book Mother Teresa, Come Be My Light, the Private Writings of the "Saint of Calcutta", edited by Fr. Brian Kolodiejchuk, M.C., was published 10 years after her death and stunned the world with the revelation of the agonizing darkness of spirit she suffered most of her adult life. Despite her deep suffering, feeling rejected by Jesus, she never lost her faith in Him. She was able to smile in spite of her suffering because she saw Jesus's face in the face of each desperately poor and suffering person she helped.

As a tool of God, this tiny saint accomplished so much, starting out alone as a missionary in India and eventually attracting more nuns to this work. From the "Inspiration Day" on September 10, 1946, when she received guidance from Christ, she worked tirelessly to bring about the founding a new religious order, the Missionaries of Charity in 1960.

The Missionaries of Charity has grown from one woman to over 4,500 nuns, as well as the Missionaries of Charity Fathers and Lay Missionaries of Charity serving in 133 countries. In the United States, there are M.C. houses in New York City; Chicago; Washington, DC; St. Louis; Miami, Detroit and many other cities. Catholic and non-Catholic lay persons are welcome to volunteer with the Missionaries of Charity.

Mother Teresa always said that she did nothing; God did it all. Mother Teresa also said "If I ever become a Saint – I will surely be one of 'darkness.' I will continually be absent from Heaven – to light the light of those in darkness on earth."

The power of faith can move mountains.

Lay Leader's Corner

This month is going to be an exciting and revealing time on God's Biblical calendar, because of all the events that are occurring and culminating in the month of September. First are the fall feasts of the Lord that include Rosh Hashanah (Sept 13-15), also known as (aka) Jewish New Year, followed by Yom Kippur (Sept 22-23), aka the Day of Atonement, followed by Sukkot (Sept 27-Oct 4), aka the Feast of Tabernacles.

Also, Sept 13th will be the end of the Sabbath of the Seventh Year and the start of the Jubilee Year. You can read about these events in Leviticus 24:23-44 and 25:1-22. And one more event that occurs on Sept 28 is the final "blood moon" which began on Passover in 2014. Much has been written about the blood moons and you can find information about them on the Christian blogs on the Internet.

For us Christians this will be an exciting time to witness what God has in store for us as a Nation which has severely fallen from grace by the recent actions and decisions taken by our Federal government to not challenge the evil that is taking over the Middle East and the persecution of the Christians still living there. We need to be in prayer for our Christian brethren and our national leadership to do the right thing and support our ally Israel.

Last month started an explanation of the ruling by the Supreme Court on the issue of homosexual marriage and why it violated our moral standards. This month we will examine why it violates our standards on the constitutional level. The following is provided by Wallbuilder's Ministry. On the Constitutional Level

"The Constitution establishes both federalism and a limited American government by first enumerating only seventeen areas in which the federal government is authorized to operate [7], and then by explicitly declaring that everything else is to be determined exclusively by the People and the States (the Ninth and Tenth Amendments).

"Thomas Jefferson thus described the overall scope of federal powers by explaining that "the States can best govern our home concerns and the general [federal] government our foreign ones." [8] He warned that "taking from the States the moral rule of their citizens and subordinating it to the general authority [federal government] . . . would . . . break up the foundations of the Union." [9] The issue of marriage is clearly a "domestic" and not a "foreign" issue, and one that directly pertains to the State's "moral rule of their citizens." But the Supreme Court rejected these limits on its jurisdiction, and America now experiences what Jefferson feared:

"'[W]hen all government, domestic and foreign, in little as in great things, shall be drawn to Washington as the center of all power, it will render powerless the checks provided of one government on another.' [10]

"By taking control of issues specifically delegated to the States, the Court has disregarded explicit constitutional limitations and directly attacked constitutional federalism."

The Missions Committee of Lake Gibson UMC will be putting together 18 backpacks for needy children at Padgett Elementary School, our neighborhood school down the block. Expansion of the Visitation Program: Just a Phone Call, or a Card, or a Visit . . .

A while back it was brought to the attention of the UMW Board that a few wonderful people in our church needed more people to join them with a ministry within our own church. That ministry is to extend the love of Christ to those who are not able to join us in church. These are individuals who are homebound, rehabilitating in a facility after being released from the hospital, or residents in independent living, assisted living or nursing homes.

Helping out doesn't have to be a big commitment – just a few minutes are needed to prepare and send a card, or to have a friendly chat on the phone. A visit is a little more time consuming, but can be not only a blessing for the individual or couple you visit, but it will almost certainly be a blessing for you!

We would like to make this as easy as possible for those of you who decide this is a way you could become more involved in the ministries of Lake Gibson UMC. Located on the side of the sound booth at the back of the sanctuary is a list of individuals who would like to be contacted. There is also a calendar for you to write on, to indicate who and when you will (or did) make contact with, and the nature of that contact: a card, a phone call or a visit. This record will allow us to see who is being missed so we can try to remedy that situation.

Below the calendar you will also see an alphabetical card file. Look for the person you will be making contact with. The card will provide their phone number, address and directions to the home or facility. Take one; there are duplicates! We would also appreciate it if you would provide feedback about your contact by filling out a "report" card, located on same table as the file. UMW Reading Program Book Review

If you want to understand the plight of the more than 10 million restaurant workers here in the United States who struggle daily to feed us, then you must read this book -- Behind the Kitchen Door. Written by Saru Jayaraman, this book opens our eyes to the fact that too many of our meals are now brought to the table by the misery of others.

Ms. Jayaraman helped to found Restaurant Opportunities Centers United (ROC United). This organization was created to support the 13,000 displaced restaurant workers in New York City who lost their jobs after the 9/11 tragedy.

The book takes us from farm workers to restaurants, describing the life of these people who live on some of the lowest wages in America. She describes not only poor working conditions, but also discriminatory labor practices, exploitation and unsanitary conditions found in some kitchens.

Reading this book is not easy, but the last chapter clearly describes actions that we all can take to improve the lives of these people who provide us with many meals out that we enjoy so much. By following just a few of these suggestions **one person** can make a huge difference.

This book may be found in the church library (FLC classroom 2) on the UMW shelf.

CORRECTION TO LGUMC COOKBOOK RECIPE

Sweet Potato Casserole

Submitted by Ann Fox/Maridell Wooley

Preheat oven to 350°

3 cups sweet potato, cooked and mashed

1 cup granulated sugar

3 eggs

½ cup milk

½ stick or ¼ cup softened butter or margarine

½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Topping:
1 cup brown sugar
½ cup self-rising flour
½ stick or 1/4 cup softened butter
or margarine
1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

You can use drained canned sweet potatoes or use 3 - 5 fresh sweet potatoes: Wash, prick with fork, and wrap individually with paper towel. Cook in the microwave about 3 - 5 minutes each, depending on size. Cool, peel and use a mixer to add the other ingredients, except topping. Pour into well-greased or sprayed 9" x 12" casserole dish. Mix topping ingredients until crumbly and well combined. Sprinkle on top of potato mixture. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 30 minutes or until top is browned.

As FUMCH requested, Jeff took the donations up the beginning of August and, as always, FUMCH staff were very appreciative. Some of you have come up to me and Jeff and wanted to know if we have taken the supplies up to the kids. If you still have any donations, we will be happy to accept them and we will take them up on our next trip.

School supplies are always needed throughout the school year. We also want to thank you for giving to the **Fifth Sunday** offering. This is <u>so important</u> to the ministry of the Children's Home to meet the needs of the children, youth and families in their care.

Another year of summer fun is winding down. It has been a productive summer full of numerous activities, outings, classes and enrichment. Twenty-seven residents were able to enjoy a week of summer camp at the Warren W. Willis United Methodist Youth Camp in Leesburg.

Last year was the first year for the on-campus school, Aldersgate Academy, which operated as a private school. This year they have officially partnered with Volusia County School district and it is now called **Legacy Scholars Academy (LSA)**. LSA provides on-campus schooling for some residents in grades K-12th. The classroom ratio will be eight students to one teacher along with one teaching assistant. There will be four classrooms with a total of 32 students. LSA is voluntary for the middle and high school students who want to attend a smaller school. One elementary classroom will be added this year. Enrollment is based on need and prior school disciplinary reports.

Madison Ranch Campus: On July 10, 2015 the Stickney Stable for Equine Therapy was officially dedicated. They are currently researching equine therapy programs and hope to have the program in place in the next couple of months. Equine therapy has shown remarkable results in helping the residents at the Enterprise campus to find a sense of healing and wholeness.
