

³⁵ This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other.

John 13:35, Common English Bible (CEB)

I have a proposition for you. What if the church were to **adopt the month of February to be its special month of love in action**? Hasn't the secular world hyped Valentine's Day for long enough? CROP Hunger Walk Sunday, February 26, 2017

If you would like to raise money for a good cause and have a relaxing, refreshing stroll after church along beautiful Lake Hollingsworth, CROP Hunger Walk is for you. Last year we had three walkers (Shirley Lux, Dwight and Phyllis Kitchens) and the congregation donated \$425.00 to the cause.

The First UMC (Lakeland) web-site (fumc.org) contains the following background information under its *Serve* page: "CROP stands for **C**ommunities **R**esponding to **O**vercome **P**overty. After World War II, churches in the mid-west started sending products such as corn, wheat, beans, canned goods, clothes, and animals on trains. These were then loaded on ships and sent to Europe. In 1969, George Sturgeon asked people to get donations for walking. The project then became: The CROP Hunger Walk. CROP now serves in 80 countries and provides shelter, food, clean water, education, and medicine where needed. Church World Service distributes the funds. Our church community walks together to take a stand against hunger in our world. Together with walkers, CROP raises awareness and funds for international relief and development, as well as local hunger-fighting."

Because of the difficulty we've had funding the programs and projects in our church budgets the last several years, we have made a decision to not push fund-raising for CROP Hunger Walk this year. If anyone would like to take the lead as LGUMC's coordinator, please contact Phyllis Kitchens, 863-984-4564 (phyllis_kitchens@hotmail.com). She can provide a recruiter kit with flyers and the forms walkers can use to list sponsors.

To donate money to this charity, one-quarter of which stays with Lakeland groups that feed the hungry, please write you checks to Lake Gibson UMC with an annotation that they are for CROP Hunger Walk. Our bookkeeper will provide all of the designated donations to the walk's organizers. (If you prefer to donate cash, please put it in an envelope marked "CROP Hunger Walk".) Put your donations in the collection plate or bring them by the church office Monday through Friday between 9:00 am and 2:00 pm.

The 2016 walk raised a total of \$22,891. Fifteen churches plus Talbot House and Lighthouse participated. The five participating United Methodist Churches (College Heights, First, Lake Gibson, Mulberry and Trinity) donated 44% of the total money raised.

The walk starts at 1:00 pm on February 26th at First Presbyterian Church, 175 Lake Hollingsworth Drive. Please bring a non-perishable foodstuff to donate to local food pantries. If you didn't donate through LGUMC, turn in your money to the organizers at the start of the walk.

Campus Revitalization Campaign

As you know, we are in the middle of raising funds for four major projects. The first is the cleaning, sealing and repainting of the outside of the sanctuary and the Family Life Center. Through mid-January we are about \$761 dollars short of attaining the Phase 1 goal.

As a reminder, the remaining phases of the Campus Revitalization Campaign are:

Phase 2. Landscaping around the campus	\$3,000

Contingency for cost overruns \$1,800


Work will be started as funds become available, progressing from phase 2 through 4. We hope that our renewed emphasis on the appearance of our campus will help attract others to check out our community of faith.

Worship Attendance Summary for the Last Three Years

Do you ever wonder if our church is growing or shrinking? We collect and report to the South Central District the total worship attendance by quarters (1st Qtr: Jan - Mar; 2nd Qtr: Apr - Jun); 3rd Qtr: Jul - Sep; 4th Qtr: Oct - Dec). The graph below shows that there has been relatively little change in the total number of people worshipping at Lake Gibson UMC over the last three years. That's not necessarily good news, since it looks like we're not achieving the goal of making more disciples for Jesus Christ, but it's not bad news, either.

The most noticeable fact is the seasonal nature of our attendance. Our winter visitors, who are usually members of their northern churches, have a big impact on LGUMC. This isn't a surprise, as we can see them filling the pews and adding their voices to our worship during the winter. The 3rd Quarter figures also show that many of us Florida residents flee during the hot, humid months.

5th Sunday Service and Chili Potluck, January 29th



Thanks to Nell Thrift, Archivist, Florida United Methodist Heritage Center, we have learned about the will of Charles O. Livingston which established the Livingston Mission Fund. Ms. Thrift wrote that

the fund has provided hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants and loans to United Methodist churches. The fund is administered by the Florida Conference.

Per the will, the trust was directed to "use the income . . . for the uplifting of Souls to God."

Mr. Livingston originally appointed the trustees of Snyder Memorial Church in Jacksonville, FL, to oversee his beguest. According to the web site, Waymarking.com, the church has been closed for some time and sits in a state of disrepair. It is currently owned by the city of Jacksonville.

The Adopt a School Initiative


While cycling through Florida, the Pedaling Parsons from North Canton, Ohio, are raising monies to help **fund partnerships between churches and local schools**. This is one of four rides held this season to raise funds for missions. Using the model taken from www.churchadoptaschool.org, they are offering \$1,000 grants to churches which want to adopt a school.

The concept is that graduations rise, while drug and alcohol use and truancy decrease, when there are effective <u>role models</u> in children's lives. They are encouraging a partnership whereby adults might visit with children weekly during their school lunch periods.



During 2016 Lake Gibson's Food Pantry gave out a total of **698 bags of groceries** and **802 bags of Publix baked goods**. People who live in our area and are in need of food can receive one bag of groceries each month and one bag of baked goods every week.

Approved 2017 Budget

[The text below was presented to the January 30th Administrative Committee and approved for execution. Editor]

LGUMC's church budget is an estimate of what we desire to be able to raise and spend during a year. We have both fixed and variable expenses within the budget. Our salaries, apportionments, and contractual obligations are considered fixed. What we spend on ministries, electricity, printed copies, etc. are considered variable and easier to change.

For 2017, there are some significant changes in the budget. We have added nearly six percent of the salaries for our Youth Director and Music Director into a Salary Contingency Fund to pay for substitutes while the directors are on vacation (if you volunteer, we save the expense). We have planned for a half-time Children's Program Director to develop programs to draw in children and young families. We have kept minimal funds in both our Maintenance Reserve (to fund property repairs) and New Equipment Purchases (to cover future upgrades and replacements). Most of our variable expenses (electricity, telephone, water, lawn maintenance, and printed materials) incurred increased costs in 2016 and are, therefore, increased within the 2017 budget.

In 2016 we set our budget at \$328,821, with \$32,882 (10%) being specified for various missions outside the church. This left \$295,938 for expenses within the congregation. As of 31 December 2016, our General Budget receipts were \$283,040. While we are generally doing slightly better in 2016 than in the past few years, we averaged \$25,186 in contributions during the past three Decembers, yet only received \$23,214 this year, \$5,450 less than in 2015.

The Finance Committee earlier in the year determined that we would not spend General Budget receipts on external missions until we had covered our other expenses. We were not willing to take it on faith that if we spent mission funds first, the balance of the needed monies to operate the church would be given by our members. Our bills are being paid on time. Our Apportionments are fully paid. Neither our Maintenance Reserve (\$8,085) nor our New Equipment Purchases (\$10,000) have been funded. Our checkbook has funds to cover approximately two weeks of operations.

For 2017, we are proposing a budget of \$321,692. This includes fully paid Apportionments as well as Property and Liability Insurance, a Maintenance Reserve, New Equipment Purchases, 'Love in Action' and the 'Food Pantry' through the General fund.

Individuals may continue to contribute designated funds to missions of their choosing. We will combine those funds and either send them along or actually expend them within the church in accordance with your wishes (examples: backpack purchases for Padgett Elementary School, bicycles for FUMCH, Lighthouse Ministries, Hope House, etc.).

Through the designated funds, we have contributed to missions, just outside of the General Budget. A total of \$18,773 was expended, \$12,128 specifically to the missions line item (5006), \$4,416 to member-designated donations (5053), and \$2,499 elsewhere.

To accomplish all programs currently within the budget, we need to see an **increase in our offerings of approximately 16% for 2017**. Without this increased support, something must eventually be dropped. We would like to move many items into the General Budget and avoid recurring campaigns to raise funds for specific items which should have been planned for and covered, over time, within our General Budget.

Finance and Related Topics, Continued Approved 2017 Budget, Continued

It would be helpful to have a 1-n prioritized list of items which would be either delayed or deleted should we not reach our financial goals for 2017. These are the four items we propose to be eliminated in this order:

- 1. Repayment of 1/10th of monies taken from Youth Endowment (\$1,500)
- 2. New Equipment Purchases (\$10,000)
- 3. Maintenance Reserve (\$8,035)
- 4. Children's Program Director, part-time (\$12,057)

For example, the first item to be unfunded would be the Youth Endowment repayment, while the last item to be eliminated would be the new Children's Program Director.

The Administrative Council approved the above proposal from the Finance Committee for our 2017 General Budget at its January 30th meeting. Now we need to assess how we will encourage our members to support the approved programs with their prayers, their labor and their tithes and offerings.

A Modest Proposal to Build a Maintenance and Repair Fund

For many years we have failed to set aside money for a Maintenance and Repair (M&R) account in our annual budgets. The last few years the General fund has carried a budget item for M&R, but the money has never been available to put into it. Recently, Pati Gilmore suggested that we build on the success of the "Make a Joyful Noise" campaign (5th Sunday pocket/piggybank change collection for FUMCH that raised \$180.06). She suggested that we put special envelopes in the backs of pews asking for pocket change or a dollar bill for the M&R fund, which would then be placed in the collection plates. Mighty oaks from little acorns grow and a journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step. What do you think? Will you help?

Income Tax Time is Coming

It's approaching that time of year when Federal Income Taxes are due. Thankfully, most of us either use payroll deduction, or pay quarterly to set aside what we believe will be due, or have taxes withheld from our pension checks. Recently I looked at our 2015 tax return and realized that our marginal tax rate (that on the last dollar earned) was 25% as a married couple. In the U.S. we have a progressive tax where we pay a higher percentage as we move through increasing tiers of income. We paid an average overall rate of 16.56%.

What I found interesting is that the Federal Government of the United States receives more per person, on average, than most people contribute to our church. Unlike in certain European countries, the U. S. Government does not collect and distribute any church taxes. Therefore, we, the church, reply upon generous contributors to continue our ministry.

Why pay taxes? Possibly it can be summed up by our Pledge of Allegiance: I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all. It is of note that 'under God' was not added to the Pledge until 1954. As a nation we say we believe in God as our ruler, with temporal leaders to help us along our way until we leave this earth. We contribute to our republic so that it might be maintained.

As Christians, we believe that a new covenant has been established with the birth and death of Jesus Christ. He embodies the concepts of the laws from the Old Testament. Yet, additionally, he offers grace given by his death upon the cross for our sins.

Throughout the Old Testament, the concept of giving was spelled out. The Levite Tithe, the Festival Tithe, Welfare Tithe, and Poor Taxes totaled some 23.33% annually. These were essentially taxes to operate a theocracy. Today, we may consider them replaced by our Federal Income Taxes which support our Republic. But, with the separation of the Church and State, our religious groups rely solely on voluntary offerings.

My step-brother, a retired Methodist minister, believes that there is no obligation to tithe (on the 1st 10% of our income) for today's Christians. He does believe that we pledge to support our church with our membership vows. Of the seven vows, number six includes: *To faithfully participate in its ministries by their prayers, their presence, their gifts, their service, and their witness.* Therefore, Methodists do, in fact, have an obligation to provide gifts to maintain and expand the work of the church. We give out of gratitude and a sense of mission. This vow is commonly linked to the pledge request we make of members of the congregation. For specific purposes, we frequently make "free will offerings" and "second-mile gifts" (voluntary religious contributions made in addition to what may be expected or required).

Is not the work of our church as important, if not more so, than that of our government? We offer not only a better life, but an eternal one. Consider our commission and how we might expand the community of faith. This requires us to renew our vows and act with vigilance.

As you work on your taxes, consider how you might also pledge and set aside an appropriate portion of your income to our church's mission. The church is everlasting and worthy of your support.

Rightsizing

Have you ever seen those advertisements with a man concerned about keeping up with his neighbors, abhorring that he is swimming in debt? It's not a pretty picture. While Maslow's hierarchy of needs reflects physiological and safety needs at the base of his pyramid, it says nothing about 'how much' is needed to meet these needs. Most living in 'third world' countries consider what we have not to be meager, but wealthy beyond belief. It is all a matter of perspective. Whether we ask to be 'supersized' or 'rightsized' is a matter of choice.

We can choose to either eat in daily, or to eat out. The first requires a smaller investment than the second. We can live in a 1,000-sq. ft. home, or a 2,500-sq. ft. home. The property appraiser will likely tell us that one is more valuable than the other, and likely more expensive. We can purchase a new replacement automobile (either by loan or with cash), or a gently used automobile. Hopefully, the second is much less expensive than the first. But, in each case, our decision places limitations on our future purchasing power.

In most cases we make choices. Some are more expensive than others. Often our earlier choices affect what we can do in the future. But from today forward, we can choose to honor God first and use the remainder of our resources to meet future needs.

As Christians, we are called constantly to balance between our desired wants and our perceived needs. We should be putting our faith in God and designating our 'first fruits' to expanding God's kingdom.

Chair Sarah Schiemann charged each member to focus work in his or her mission area on moving LGUMC toward actively living our Mission statement: Sharing God's Love through Action, and achieving our Vision: To be a joyful church family that is crucial to our community.

The Board of Trustees

We will meet with the painter soon to schedule his work (as of January 22nd, we were short only \$761 of paying for the painting project). We expect the work to start by early February. As a reminder, the Administrative Council selected the Sherwin-Williams color "Camelback", sw6122. You can see the color on the Sherwin-Williams web site using their Visualize Color tool. The trim color will remain the same as it is now, a dark, chocolate brown.



We are starting each phase of the Campus Revitalization Campaign as the funds become available. The next challenge will be raising money for re-landscaping the campus (Phase 2), estimated to cost \$3,000. Ann Fox is leading the selection of Florida-friendly, low maintenance plants with advice from Lee Mueller and Florida Master Gardeners. All of the old landscaping around the buildings was removed in January. [A big thanks to Brad Fox and Tom Burns!! And thanks to Ann Fox for her pictures! Editor]

What remained to be done in late January was for volunteers to come in with rakes and shovels to remove any little roots or plants that the blade didn't get. We need the planting beds leveled to help the painter access the walls safely.

Several people have asked when the concrete circle between A Little Bit of Heaven Child Enrichment Center and the Sanctuary will be repaired. This work is Phase 3 of the Campus Revitalization Campaign. Once the painting and landscaping are completed, we will tackle the concrete circle. We are planning to have the concrete cut to resemble cobblestones and painted in a color to coordinate with the sanctuary.

The next Trustees meeting will be held Monday, February 6th at 2:00 pm in the office.

United Methodist Women (UMW), Continued Preparations for Lakeland's First Wonder Walk April 22nd, Continued

At the January 21st South Central District UMW Leadership Training we were told that donations of **any amount** will have an impact. A single scholarship to the Rosa Valdez Center costs around \$2,200. The families of the children who should attend rarely have this kind of money. With the loss of the Florida Conference's apportionment for the Rosa Valdez Center, it is critical that other sources of funds be obtained.

It was suggested that, since this is the 37th year for Wonder Walk, we should commit to each walker raising a minimum of \$37.00 -- this should be doable, even for Lake Gibson. All we need is some volunteers to recruit walkers and collect pledges. Again, as with CROP Hunger Walk, we would prefer that donations be sent through our church which will then send 100% of the money raised to the Wonder Walk organizers.

The Lakeland walk will start at 8:00 am on Saturday, April 22nd and you don't need to pre-register. Just show up with your pledge sheets and \$ (or tell them that the church will forward a check). Walkers need to sign a release form, which is in the recruiter package, to participate.

A continental breakfast will be offered before the walk, and lunch will be ready about 11:00 am. There will be an opening ceremony at College Heights UMC before the walk starts. There is no required distance; walk as long as you feel like. You can also sit on a bench and pray for the walkers and for the Rosa Valdez Center's children. (Walkers will be given tags bearing the image of a child who attends the center to focus their prayers.) The walk will go from College Heights UMC to Lake Hollingsworth; a police officer will control traffic. The route will be marked with signs indicating the distance walked. College Heights UMC is located at 942 South Blvd, Lakeland 33803.
