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From the Pastor's Desk

I am thankful for the timing of Easter this year. I am sure by now you realize that Easter occurs on April Fool's Day – April 1 this year. Sadly the resurrection of the Lord Jesus is disputed and/or denied by many across the world, and the events surrounding the crucifixion of God's Son are scoffed at. Many people will tell you that they do not believe in a God that could or would allow His own son to die such a cruel death. The Apostle Paul acknowledged this when he wrote in 1 Corinthians 1:23 (NIV):

"... but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles,"

In light of the events surrounding Lent this year: the killings at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School here in our own state which occurred on Ash Wednesday; the other shootings across our land and the atrocities occurring across the world; the collapse of the FIU pedestrian bridge and the destruction it caused; the deaths of loved ones in our community of faith; I am thankful for the message of the Resurrection. It is only because of Christ's empty grave that we have hope in the midst of despair and death, when all seems lost, when there seems to be no way, when every door is blocked and it is certain that we will perish, the resurrection says God loves you and it will be okay. Or as Paul put it in the 15th chapter of I Corinthians:

"Where, O death, is your victory?
Where, O death, is your sting?" 1 Cor 15:55 (NIV)

Have you ever noticed the progression of Christianity? In all other religions, birth is the beginning and the religion progresses toward death, but in Christianity life begins with death. (I hesitate to say Christianity is a religion – to me it is a way of living – religion is a list of rules man has devised so man can become God.) Christianity teaches that a person must die to self in order to live in the glory of God. It is only when the old man is crucified that we truly begin to live life. Christianity teaches that when true disciples of God die they move on to life eternal. Our faith begins at the grave and moves on to life. Christianity is always moving toward a hopeful future in the absolute, perfect love of God.

If we think about it, the natural world works this way. A mighty oak tree that can stand the forces of a hurricane began with the death of an acorn; a stalk of corn that can feed a family began with the death of a single kernel of corn. Our nation (the USA) teaches that the death of its patriots strengthens the resolve of independence for others. Thank God for the empty tomb and the message it sends to the world today. When all seems lost, there is still God. He is still on the throne and continues to love mankind – each and every one of us. There is hope in God – no matter what.

March News/Wonder Walk East Continued

Bonnie and Phyllis walked around Lake Hollingsworth while Mike and Ruth packed 175 "Care Packages for Kids", weekend food bags for low-income children attending 5 Polk County child care centers affiliated with Cornerstone (2 in Mulberry and 3 in Lakeland). (Cornerstone supports a total of 15 Polk County centers, 14 of which need Care Packages; at Wonder Walk East we only had enough food for kids in these 5 centers.)

Bonnie delivered Care Packages to Mulberry to Kids in Motion I (73% of the enrollees' families are at or below the poverty level) and Kids in Motion II (81% at or below poverty level); two of her Guardian ad Litem children are enrolled there. Ruth delivered Care Packages to Mary's Little Lambs Child Care Center (95% at or below poverty level) on E. Memorial Blvd, Lakeland.

These deliveries are a one-time mission; however, the Lake Gibson team are examining the feasibility of developing a long-term relationship with Mary's Little Lambs in hope that some on the families served might become involved with our church. Their food bags contained invitations to attend the Easter Cantata

Other churches that support Cornerstone's nutrition program do so by preparing a Care Package for one weekend a month. The cost of each Care Package is \$5.50; currently there are 41 children in need of weekend food at Mary's Little Lambs, for a total of \$225.50 per month. That's a significant cost for our church, so careful study will be needed to figure out if or how to fund the effort. It looks like we wouldn't need to store these foods, but could buy them just before they are packed. One or two people would take the packages to the center before the weekend.

There are 10 foods plus a nutrition booklet for the parents in each pack. The contents are a Go Go Squeeze (a mixture of a fruit and a vegetable); fruit juice; raisins; veggies (packed in plastic); tuna or chicken salad and crackers; Beef-A-Roni; cereal; milk (Carnation Essentials); whole wheat crackers and cheese; and Z-Bar Kids. The packs provide nutritionally sound food for each child. According to Cornerstone, ninety percent of brain development occurs before elementary school. Also good nutrition habits related to food are formed before elementary school, making this mission one that should have lasting impact on the children.

As always, this is a labor-intensive undertaking. Lake Gibson men and women are needed over a 4-day period to put on this sale. Workers are needed Wednesday, April 18th, 9:00 am until you're tired to empty the sheds and Thursday, April 19th, 9:00 am until you're tired to set up the sales areas, price the items, and check out any electronics or small appliances to make sure they are working. Then on Friday and Saturday we need people to be cashiers and baggers at the two exit doors, as well as people to assist our customers in the various sales areas of the floor, and to help carry out the purchases when necessary. (We also need lots of plastic grocery bags.)

Unsold items will be loaded onto a Salvation Army vehicle starting at noon Saturday. Then we get to return the FLC to its normal condition for Sunday School the next day.

Thank you in advance for the success of this sale, the UMW's primary source of mission funding!

5th Sunday, April 29th

You will note that we spent much more in February than in January. Primarily, this was due to our intentionally paying our Property and Liability Insurance in whole to take advantage of an offered 2% discount from the conference.

We are attempting to simultaneously raise funds to support each of the above three projects. Each of these projects could be accomplished with an **additional \$5 per week per adult per project**. The reroofing will take two years of contributions, the air conditioners will take three years, and the insurance deductible reserve fund will take five years to be fully funded at that rate.

Projects Using Designated Funds

When we first started attending Lake Gibson UMC, we heard that some members were concerned that funds designated for a particular objective had been directed towards a different purpose. One example was \$15,000 taken from our Endowment Fund principle and spent on roof repairs for the FLC. These funds were part of \$50,000 originally set aside for development of a Youth/Children's program within LGUMC. Of course, as an endowment, our contract only permitted us to withdraw 90% of the *interest earned* on the principal, with the intent that the principal will never disappear. We violated that agreement.

Over the past seven years, we have emphasized the use of Designated Funds as opposed to raising new Endowments. Designated Funds may be spent in whole, as raised, for a particular purpose. While we would love to see our entire budget raised each year, it appears that our members are unwilling or unable to meet that objective. But, this does not mean that they will not support particular projects in which they are interested.

When a need arises which is not planned for within the general operating budget of the church, the Administrative Council discusses the identified issue and determines whether they will support that need or not. All members are welcome to attend these meetings. After discussion, committee chairs, Lay Leader, etc. vote on the issue.

Projects Using Designated Funds, Continued

Earlier in this decade we identified the need to replace the carpeting within the Family Life Center (FLC). Over many months we raised \$10,000 to re-carpet, with some monies left over for a number of cleanings. Back in June 2014, we identified the need to upgrade our audio-visual equipment in the Sanctuary with new monitors, sound boards, and related equipment. We raised \$21,750 and upgraded our sanctuary's capabilities, improving our worship programs.

In May 2016, the Administrative Council discussed, and approved, a plan to address some of the suggestions made by our District Superintendent's staff. Many of these addressed how inviting our church is to visitors and their initial impressions. The Administrative Council chose to address four of the recommendations and ranked them in a priority sequence. It was understood at that time that we would probably need to replace the sanctuary's roof in three to five years.

Item one was renewing the look of our church by repainting the exterior of the sanctuary and FLC (\$22,700).

Item two was changing the landscaping around the campus (\$3,000). While we raised funds for this purpose, work was delayed primarily due to weather. Much of it has now been completed.

Item three was working on the entrance circle in front of the sanctuary (\$4,500). While it was cleaned and repainted, we did not get exactly what we had anticipated. The United Methodist Men are now looking at ways to appropriately fill the cracks which were not fixed earlier.

Item four was installation of an electronic sign which we could use to easily inform those driving down W. Daughtery Road of the many programs within the church (\$30,000). We have signed a contract for the sign and paid the first 50% of the cost. We are awaiting permitting, manufacturing, and installation.

In November 2017, the Administrative Council addressed three additional issues which were not fully identified by any of our prior year's budgets. In January 2018, the congregation was informed of the need to fund, over time, these items:

- 1. Roof replacement for the sanctuary, estimated to cost \$60,000 and requiring funding of \$5 per adult per week for two years (2018-2019).
- 2. Air conditioner replacement for units in the sanctuary and FLC, estimated to cost \$105,000, requiring \$5 per adult per week for three years (2018-2020).
- 3. Establishing an Insurance Deductible Reserve Account in the amount of \$181,170 (five percent of the value of our property and furnishings as of 2017), requiring \$5 per adult per week for five years (2018-2022).

All the items mentioned within this article use Designated Funds, separate from our general operating budget. We still require regular tithes and offerings to keep the doors open for worship, study, and other activities. When raised, these Designated Funds may not be spent for any other purpose.

One may ask: "Why not include these projects within the general operating budget?" Since contributions have not been sufficient to cover even the normal, desired day-to-day operations included in the general operating budget, we rely upon specific appeals to raise additional funds for very specific objectives. Each objective is discussed and voted upon by your church leadership through the Administrative Projects Using Designated Funds continued on the next page . . .

Council. Your voice, either supporting or rejecting these ideas, should be presented there. There may be disagreements from time-to-time on the direction we are taking, but once a decision is made, please understand that this is the direction which the majority of the church has chosen to take.

You always have an additional individual vote by choosing to not contribute to a Designated Fund, but once the funds are raised, we do not have an option of spending it on something else.
