From the Pastor's Desk

There are 3 big events that occur in May: Mother's Day, Pentecost and Graduation. While each of these events is significant on its own, I wonder, do they have something in common? On Mother's Day we remember our mothers and the love they showed for us over the years. If asked, most mothers would wish that their children would be happy in life and contribute to the good of society. Mothers may put an emphasis on education, and thus celebrate their child's graduation from high school or college as an achievement of maturity. In the mind of many mothers graduation means the training is over and now the child can contribute to society with the knowledge and wisdom they have acquired. In *The Story*, last month we discussed Solomon's proverb that, "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom". As Christians we understand that knowledge and wisdom are gifts of God.

Religiously speaking, the big day of this month is Pentecost. This event described in the book of Acts, chapter 2, occurs 50 days after Easter when the Holy Spirit descends on those believers gathered in the upper room, and they go out and "preach the gospel" to the crowds in various languages. We are told that 3,000 people come to believe on the Lord Jesus from the message delivered that day. We call this the "birth of the church". This is the day the church as we know it comes into existence.

God births the church here much as a mother births her child. If mothers desire the best for their children, what do you think God desires for his child – the church? Of course, He also wants them to feel loved, be happy and contribute to society. In the physical world we teach our children they need to get an education and practical experience to contribute to society, yet often times in the church we put very little emphasis on training God's children to act prudently and responsibility in society. We expect God to supernaturally give that ability to us. Yet God tells us in Proverbs that we are to "train up the child in the way he should go".

Just as a parent has the responsibility to make sure a child is sent to school and that the school that child is attending is meeting its duty in teaching the appropriate subjects, I ask, have the leaders of the church met their responsibility to teach proper scriptural theology and practice?

We also have to realize that there is a requirement on the children to apply themselves in school – you can send them, but they have to learn the principles taught. I ask you that question now concerning your faith – have you properly applied yourself to the teaching of your church? Have you diligently studied and put into practice your faith, or is your faith training haphazard? Maybe the three events celebrated this month are tied together as we try to serve our Lord and impact society for the Kingdom.

Maybe we should consciously and diligently devote ourselves to learning the principles of our faith and then put them into practice. What do you think?

Thanks to Glenda Hess, Music Director, and all who raised their voices in praise.






UMW Spring Rummage Sale, April 20 and 21

Mega thanks to all who supported me in providing 162 food bags for Polk County's Homeless Graduating Seniors.

It was a privilege to attend the luncheon at the Bartow Civic Center on April 19th. Two of the young men at my table were from Lakeland High School. One lives with his best friend's family and the other at the Talbot House in a room with 30 men. Both will be attending Traviss Technical College in the fall. One to be an auto mechanic and one to be a chef. The young man at the Talbot House also works at McDonalds.

Both sat at the table before lunch checking out all the food in their bags. One is allergic to peanuts, so they were trading items back and forth. I heard many good comments about the variety of food. In addition to the food bag they received a rolling duffle bag filled with basic toiletry items. In some pictures you will see pillows, twin sheet sets, throws, first aid kits, etc. They also received \$55 in Walmart and fast food gift cards. The highlight was the distribution of electronic tablets to all who attended the luncheon. This was made possible by a special donation.

The speaker was originally from New York but now resides in Orlando. He was a high school dropout and single father of 3 before the age of 17. He now has a GED, Bachelor's Degree, Master's Degree and two days before the luncheon he received a letter stating he now has his PhD. Everyone celebrated with him for his accomplishments. He was so impressed with this program that he donated his services. At times both he and his wife were visibly emotional.

Without your help, the City of Lakeland Community Involvement Committee and the Collegiate National Honor Society this could not have been accomplished.



A Methodist woman from West Virginia, Ann Reeves Jarvis, created and advocated for Mother's Day in 1868. Initially called Mothers' Friendship Day, she promoted this special day to bring about the peaceful reconciliation of former Confederate and Union soldiers by bringing together their mothers.

After she died her daughter, Anna Jarvis, continued to promote creation of a national Mother's Day to honor the sacrifices of mothers. The first official Mother's Day was celebrated on May 10, 1908 at Methodist churches in Grafton, WV and Philadelphia, PA. In 1914 President Wilson declared Mother's Day as a national observance.

I've made a lot of friends here; they are my church family. Of course, so many of my friends have passed on now. The biggest influence on me was probably Lillie May Hughes, Danny Hughes' mother. She was a member of College Heights UMC which started Lake Gibson."

The above reflect that we are not over-obligating the church, and not spending more than we have in our accounts. But, we are not raising funds at the rate we had discussed for our three new designated accounts: 1) roof replacement, 2) air conditioning replacement, and 3) setting aside money for an insurance reserve fund to cover a catastrophic act of nature.

Earlier, we asked each of the 134 member families if they would contribute approximately \$5 per week per adult to each of the above three designated funds. Roof replacement would take two years, air conditioner replacement would take three years, and our insurance reserve would take five years before we had raised sufficient funds. At this point, eleven weeks after our initial announcement in mid-January, we would have hoped for contributions similar to the following (134 families times 15 weeks times \$5 per account):

*\$13,902 of this amount was carried over from the end of December 2017, meaning that we have actually contributed \$3,464 of new funds during 2018 for air conditioner replacements.

Unless we increase our contributions in the future, we will have to delay our execution of these projects much further into the future. Merely designating funds for these purposes without increasing total contributions serves no purpose. We all need to increase the total amount we give to insure that both our general operating costs are met now and our future projects are completed on time.

What's Going On with the Altar Flowers?

Several people have noticed the lack of flowers on the altar rail during some worship services and have asked why. I consulted Marina Hernandez, Administrative Secretary, to find out what has happened and what the procedure is now to obtain these flowers for Sunday services.

Our long-time florist closed in 2017. Frankly, we were getting a bargain from her: two large, showy vases of cut flowers for \$30.00 (and we supplied the vases). She delivered them to the office on Fridays at no extra charge. Since she closed, Marina has not been able to find another florist who would give us comparable sized arrangements and service for the same \$30.00.

The procedure has always been that people in the church sign up to donate the money to purchase the altar flowers for a specific date. There has been a large, green signup sheet on the bulletin board in the Narthex with places for up to two individuals or couples to order these flowers for each Sunday. (That way the cost could be shared and each person or couple could take home a vase after the second service.) The last Sunday in April it appeared that the flower signup sheet was missing. Marina will put up another one.

Unfortunately, some people forgot that they signed up to purchase flowers and failed to pay, leaving the church to handle this unplanned expenditure -- not an acceptable situation. So, here's the current procedure:

- 1. If you want to pay for altar flowers for a specific date, call Marina (863-858-5431) or email her at office@lakegibsonumc.com stating your desire. Arrange to pay her in advance before she places the order on Wednesday. She will purchase cut flowers and arrange them in donated vases (sorry, \$30 doesn't cover the cost of the vessels). This way we will have live flower arrangements that can be seen from the back pews.
- 2. If you have any vases you'd like to donate to be used for altar flowers, please bring them into the office.

3. As an alternative, you may order and bring the flower arrangements to church yourselves. Just let Marina know in advance and annotate that you will supply the arrangements on a specific Sunday on the Narthex form, so we don't have more than two.

If having altar flowers during worship services is important to you, please consider making or buying seasonal silk flower arrangements which can be brought out when live flowers aren't available. Storage space in the Sanctuary is limited, but we can try to reserve a place to store a few arrangements. (Loose silk flowers are not requested, only arrangements in vases.)

Bikes for FUMCH



Phyl and I spent a week at FUMCH, working on bicycles from Monday, April 2nd through Sunday, April 5th. We were joined by neighbors, Inez and Hank Rogerson, for four of those days. For the first time we serviced all the bikes at every cottage! (The unfixable ones were swapped out with rideable ones from the storage shed.) The only ones not serviced were those that may have been locked inside children's rooms.

We started the week at the bike storage shed, spending two and a half days fixing as many there as we could, cannibalizing others

too badly damaged and saving components to use for spare parts. We also moved the junk hidden on the far side of the shed so it could be seen and removed. While we were working there a drone flew over and observed us -- what a weird feeling that is. (We think someone was videoing construction on the Lamar Louise Curry Early Childhood Education Development Center nearby.)

We've come to a conclusion: **All future bike purchases for FUMCH should be single-speed models**. These kids don't know how to shift gears and damage or destroy them. Apparently few adults on campus are able to teach them how to ride multi-speed bikes. If LGUMC buys any more new bikes, they should be "beach cruiser" models. For years we have advocated for multi-speed bikes due to the proximity of a wonderful bike trail, thinking the children and house parents would ride on it, but that does not seem to be the case.

We also delivered 5 repaired bikes donated by church members and neighbors -- all multi-speed. We'll keep taking up whatever rideable bikes we receive, regardless of the models, but having to stock multiple types of gear shifters and other spare parts is expensive, and rebuilding complex components takes a lot of time. We thank the congregation members who continue to donate to the Bicycle Repair Fund -- we typically buy \$200 - \$400 worth of parts, tubes and tires before each trip to FUMCH.

By the way, the most popular type of bike with teenaged boys: Anything they can ride motocross-style and do tricks! Their favorites are small, 20" wheeled, single-speed and WITHOUT brakes!!! They must wear out a lot of shoes.
