I know we are in the middle of Lent, yet I think this is important enough to reiterate. Lent is a time of penance as we remember our sin and our Lord's sacrifice to free us from that bondage. The common practice in Lent is to give something up – the most common thing people give up is food. People give up sweets, caffeine, sugar, sodas, ice cream, rich foods and much more. Our United Methodist church is in the midst of turmoil over the LGBTQ issue. I am suggesting for Lent and the rest of this year we think a little differently and instead of giving up things, we give up the following:

Give up all your negative thoughts, and instead of thinking negatively, focus on the hope we are all offered as we serve God and the wonderful things He can do for us. See possibilities, not obstacles.

Give up gossip and talking about others in a bad light. Instead, only say things that lift up others, repeat only good and let the negative things stop by not repeating them. Brag on the good in others knowing they are loved by God just as you are.

Give up the worries and anxieties we have in life and trust that God is with you and will make a way for you.


Give up loneliness and begin to fellowship with others in the love of the Lord.

Introducing a New Church Calendar!

The LGUMC online calendar, accessed from our church web site at www.lakegibsonumc.com, has been refreshed to reflect activity categories. Items have been assigned to a category and each **category is color-coded** to help you more easily find items of interest. Categories include Sunday Services, Small Group Gatherings, Special Events, Church Leadership, ALBOH, and National Holidays. Here's an example:



By default, the calendar is now set at a **weekly view**, rather than a monthly view. You may still click either the Monthly tab or the Agenda tab to see a slightly different perspective.

If you click on an item, additional detail may be available. Should you be responsible for one of the entries, you can give Marina that additional information and ask her to add it under "more details" for your event. This is a great way to let casual viewers of our calendar get a more in-depth understanding about what will occur during that event or time period. If you wrote about your event for the church newsletter, you might want to condense your comments and provide them to the office for the calendar as well.

Please note: If you use a Google Calendar for your personal planning, you may open any event on the LGUMC calendar and click on "copy to my calendar" to duplicate that event on your own personal calendar. This should make it easier to schedule your time and to remember church activities.

The Pedaling Parsons stopped for the night in the following towns: Hernando (start and end point), Groveland, Lakeland (arrived at LGUMC the afternoon of February 6th and departed the morning of the 7th), Wauchula, Punta Gorda, Venice, Bradenton, Tampa and Spring Hill.



Are You Podcast Qualified?

What is a podcast and how does it work? Why should you care?

Podcasting is a free service that allows Internet users to pull **audio** files (typically MP3's) from a podcasting Web site to listen to on their computers or personal digital **audio** players. The term comes from a combination of the words iPod (a personal digital **audio** player made by Apple) and broadcasting.

If you have an iPad, iPod, Smartphone or computer, you might listen to music during your day. Podcasts permit you to play audio files in lieu of your music. These may be interesting, educational, and enjoyable. Most subscriptions are free.

With newer cars, your audio system may permit you to connect your device with your car's speaker system thru Bluetooth technology. This permits you to play your podcasts thru the car's speakers as you drive.

Each podcast player operates slightly differently. You can subscribe to a podcast of interest and get new downloads as they occur. .A perfect example are podcasts from http://www.umc.org/topics/podcasts.

Additionally, after Pastor Rob Atchley's recent Sunday school series, you might find Small Groups in the Wesleyan Way of special interest.

If you've not listened to these before, check out <u>Get Your Spirit In Shape</u>. If you can't use the hyperlinks included in this article, you can search on the titles in your Internet browser. You should be able to easily find the link.

The Apple Store or Android's Play Store offer various podcast players, both free and paid versions. For Windows 10 a recommendation is <u>Grover Pro</u>, at a one-time cost of \$2.99.

A Month of Tuesdays at Hope Center

As many of you know, Lake Gibson members Rick and Debbie McLellan have a heart for service to the homeless men and women in north Lakeland. Every Tuesday they provide food, fellowship and scripture at Hope House (also referred to as Hope Center), a small house on US 98 not far from our church. The information below was taken from the McLellan's weekly reports [due to space limitations, breakfast service is not included].

As you will see, many in Lake Gibson UMC have responded to Rick and Debbie's requests for support by providing donations during March. If there were more volunteers to serve as the McLellans do, Hope House could be open one or two more days a week than it is now.

March 5th: At Lunchtime, Rick McLellan led our guests in prayer and a devotion from John, chapter 13, AS I HAVE LOVED YOU. Then Debbie and Rick served 21 guests roasted turkey breast, mashed potatoes with gravy, and green beans. We also sent out about a dozen to-go plates. To quench thirst was coffee, milk and iced tea.

The ice machine is not working. Our homeless guests were tired today; many said they were kept awake by the storms. Some had tents that leaked in heavy rain and there were more than the usual wet blankets and sheets to be washed. We had trouble with the center dryer heating, but finally found it worked on the permanent press setting.

One of our young lady guests tripped a breaker in the bathroom with her hair dryer and it took a while to figure out it was the breaker labeled FIRE ALARM. With the light back on, the shower was busy. We gave out many canned goods, and many toiletry items. We especially need socks right now and could use pop-top cans (Chef Boy R Dee, etc.) which our guests rely on like supper in a can. (We are closed at suppertime.)

March 5th: Continued

We are getting some cooler nights and requests are coming for blankets. We gave out the last one in the back room and one that we had in our trunk. We had a good day and left feeling that hearts and lives were touched and that Hope Center is making a difference!

March 12th: At Lunchtime, Rick McLellan led our guests in prayer and a devotion from John, Chapter 13, LEANING ON JESUS. Then Debbie and Rick served 23 guests sloppy joes, macaroni and cheese, jalapeno poppers, and lemon meringue pie for dessert. We also sent out about a dozen to-go plates.

It was a hot day for March and the ice machine worked great all day. We had some back-up in the laundry due to 2 broken washers, but Brent is working to get that resolved. The shower was busy all day. We brought in a number items for the pantry and are grateful to all (especially to Ray and Bonnie Strait, Phyllis Kitchens [Sarah Schiemann, Linda Alvarez] and Lilia Harbaugh) who gave us food and other items, but we could more use pop-top cans. [Donors' names corrected. Ed.]

We also are grateful to Leon and Kathy Rumohr, who won \$20 from Love in Action at Lake Gibson United Methodist Church and donated it, which enabled us to buy socks which are desperately needed right now.

March 19th: At Lunchtime, Rick McLellan led our guests in prayer and a devotion from John, chapter 5, HOPE RESTORED. Then Debbie and Rick served 19 guests pinto beans with sausage over rice, whole kernel corn, and fresh baked cornbread. We also sent out about ten to-go plates.

It was a cool, wet day. The ice machine worked great all day. The shower was busy all day. We brought in 40 pop-top cans, a Blessing from Love in Action at Lake Gibson United Methodist Church, but gave almost all of them out today. We also gave out many health and toiletry items.

March 19th, Continued

We also are grateful to Julio and Elba Santana (of Bread of Life Christian Mission) who donated a number of items, including the pinto beans used for lunch today. One of the End Zone Restaurant Managers brought in a number of large pans of cooked corned beef brisket which really looked great. Some are in the refrigerator and some are in the freezer. What a Blessing!

March 26th: At Lunchtime, Rick McLellan led our guests in prayer and a devotion from John, chapter 15, REAL FRIENDSHIP. Then Debbie and Rick served 26 guests rotini with meat sauce, a fresh garden salad with sliced tomatoes and cucumbers and a choice of dressings, along with Cuban bread with garlic butter. We also sent out about ten to-go plates.

It was a hot day today. The ice machine was broken, we brought a bag of ice. The shower was busy all day. We want to thank the members of Lake Gibson United Methodist Church who provided so many needed supplies, pop-top canned goods, and many health and toiletry items. It was a very busy day, and the Lord met the needs of many people today at the Hope House.

Children's Ministry Makes a Prayer Wall

Each participant at Wonder Walk receives a **Prayer Tag** to wear during the walk and to take home. The colorful tag includes a **photo and the first name of a child** enrolled in the Rosa Valdez Center. Instructions on the back of the tag read "**Please pray for this child and the 177 Center and nearly 20,000 other children who are served each year by Cornerstone Family Ministries**."

Our prayer wall in the FLC will display these tags, and perhaps, in the future, tags for the children enrolled in ALBOH and in our Children's Ministry. Please TAKE A TAG HOME WITH YOU, and post it where you are reminded to pray for that child daily. Share the love of God!

Lakeland Volunteers in Medicine: Moving, Expanding and Needing More Volunteers!

Linda and Charlie Alvarez are longtime volunteers at Lakeland Volunteers in Medicine (LVIM) and would like more people at our church to be involved in helping others in this critically important medical and dental service mission. LVIM serves the working uninsured -- people who are working to support themselves and their families, but who do not make enough money to buy insurance.

As many of you know, LVIM is about to move into its new, larger building near the Florida United Methodist Conference head-quarters on Lake Wire. With a 50% increase in clinical space, there is a need for more support volunteers.
