	Thoughts from the Pastor		

Penny and I love redbirds. We love watching them flit about, hearing their tweets to one another, enjoying their bright colors, the way they teach their young; it all speaks to us. In order to attract redbirds to our yard we put up a bird feeder. The first one was on a pole, but the squirrels kept destroying both the seed and the feeder. After several failed remedies and a few partially successful ones, I hung a feeder from a tree limb with a wire the squirrels could not climb down. One problem solved: The squirrels now can only get to the seed spilled on the ground.

The next problem was that the doves, starlings, blue jays and rice birds attacked the feeder, especially in the winter when food is scarce. Normally a full feeder will last 10-14 days; in the winter it can be gone in 3 days. So I switched to the more expensive songbird feed thinking maybe the other birds wouldn't like it as much. Guess what? They all liked it better – it disappeared faster than the old food, but the redbirds did love it.

Now I fill the feeder up on Fridays so Penny can watch the birds over the weekend. Sometimes the feed makes it through the week and other times it doesn't, but the redbirds keep coming back to check it out on a regular basis. I think there are 3 families of redbirds now using our feeder and they bring us much joy as we observe them and listen to their songs. However, the other birds we could do without, plus there is a black snake, an owl and a red-shoulder hawk that visit because of the increase of prey in the area. In some ways I am frustrated that creatures other than redbirds are profiting from my feeder, yet they are God's creatures, too. I see a parallel in my feeder and the Christian life.

Many people can profit off my Christian actions -- people I may not know, like or agree with -- yet because others profit off my actions, can I stop trying to do the right thing? The church and diligent Christians strive for justice and mercy, we have compassion on the needy and try to help those in dire situations with food, shelter, support, encouragement and spiritual guidance. There are many people that have learned to prey on that goodness to benefit themselves without any thought of responsibility or thankfulness on their part. Like the blue jays that eat my bird seed, they take yet give nothing in return other than leave a mess. God told Abraham he would be a blessing to all nations and that did not change when the church came into existence.

The church is a blessing to all people because God's grace and mercy extend to all. Like Penny and I have learned with the bird feeder, in order to have the joy of the redbirds we have to feed some undesirable birds and deal with some creatures who seek to steal from or harm our beloved redbirds. Yet God has rewarded us with multiple families of redbirds eating at our feeder. Who knows – if we feed them songbird feed long enough maybe the others will learn a new song. Don't laugh -- with God all things are possible and *all people can become new creatures through faith in Jesus Christ*.

Letter from the UM Council of Bishops on the 2016 General Conference

To the people of The United Methodist Church:

The Council of Bishops brings you greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ who has called us to be servant leaders of the church. In 1812, Bishop Francis Asbury, Bishop William McKendree and General Conference Secretary Daniel Hitt sent the first letter to churches following General Conference. This letter seeks to revive that tradition. Many bishops will also be communicating individually in their own areas.

Hundreds of lay and clergy delegates from around the world gathered in Portland, Oregon, along with bishops and pastors, church members and staff, volunteers and visitors, to engage in Christian conferencing, to make decisions for our church's future, to affirm our global connection, to worship and to celebrate God's faithfulness.

We celebrated the success of our Imagine No Malaria initiative, which seeks to raise \$75 million in the fight against malaria, a disease that takes the life of a child in Africa every two minutes. We celebrated our ecumenical partnerships as we move into full Communion with the Uniting Church in Sweden and toward full Communion with the Moravian church. We celebrated our heritage: the 250th anniversary of our oldest church, John Street United Methodist Church, the 200th anniversary of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the 150th anniversary of United Methodist Women, the 25th anniversary of Africa University and others.

We continued in our acts of repentance with a presentation from the Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes about the Methodist involvement in the 1864 Sand Creek massacre. We shared in the consecration of deaconesses and home missioners and the commissioning of missionaries. We moved toward a global Book of Discipline and global Social Principles. We voted to add five new bishops in Africa after 2020, and approved a churchwide study on our ecclesiology.

The Episcopal address set the tone for the event, focusing on humility and lifting up our accomplishments. We heard from our laity an invitation to members to be more involved in making disciples and getting involved in ministries to bring the love of Christ to others. We heard our young people say they "are engaged in Christ's journey with energy and love." We also heard them say clearly that they do not want a divided church and urged us to "be in unity even if we do not have unanimity." They give us hope for our future.

The body had difficult and challenging work before it as we acknowledged our differences over human sexuality. Amidst those differences, the delegates affirmed they want their bishops to lead and we found ourselves with an opportunity for a holy moment. We spoke candidly about what divides us and what our church might look like in the future if we dared to consider new possibilities. We offered a way forward, postponing decisions about sexuality matters and committing to having a different kind of global conversation that allows all voices to be heard.

Our differences do not keep us from being the body of Christ. They do not keep us from doing good in the world. They do not keep us from making a difference – and so we set forth bold new goals: to make a million new disciples of Jesus Christ; to engage 3 million new people to make a difference in the world; to transform 400 communities for vital abundant living; to reach a million children with lifesaving health interventions; and to double the number of vital congregations.

Most importantly, we affirmed our commitment to stay united. We proved that we are more than debates and divisions, more than rules and resolutions. We stood together as the body of Christ. As we reflect on

our time in Portland, our prayer is for unity in the church for the advancement of our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

As John Wesley reminded us, "Best of all, God is with us."

The UMW Invites Everyone to Learn About The Estates at Carpenters on June 8th



2016 Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church June 16 - 18, 2016

This year's Florida Annual Conference will be held at the Buena Vista Palace Hotel in Orlando, close enough that carpooling is feasible. You can read about the issues that will be discussed and voted on in the Conference Workbook, as well as see a list of the events and speakers scheduled at the following web site: <u>www.flumc.org/annualconference2016</u>.

The Workbook contains a wealth of information about Florida United Methodist churches, which are listed by district. If you want to see which churches have been closed, learn about new church starts, see which churches paid 100% of their 2015 apportionments (and which paid the highest dollar amounts) and more, it's all there.

Want to know how much money was contributed by Florida UM churches last year on each of the six Special Sundays with Offerings? Or contributed to the Florida United Methodist Children's Home (FUMCH)? Some of the information is pretty dry, but it does put Lake Gibson's finances into a broader context.

You can read reports from the Conference Lay Leader, Lay Servant Ministries, UMM and UMW. There's a list of all of the church properties administered under the Board of Trustees (closed churches and their parsonages). There are reports from Duke Divinity School and Florida Southern College, as well as from FUMCH.

There are 4 resolutions presented near the end of the Workbook:

1. Resolution to Support Equality of Love and Value for both Born and Unborn Children.

2. Resolution Requesting the Re-establishment of the Office of Director of Hispanic Ministries for the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church.

- 3. Resolution: Drivers' Licenses for All Florida Drivers.
- 4. Resolution: Florida Conference [Form an] Immigrant and Refugee Task Force.

The hard copy Workbook is 185 pages long; the electronic version and annexes contain additional information that arrived too late to be printed. So far I'm on page 18. This will be my first Annual Conference (attending as the LGUMC Lay Delegate). If I ever finish this newsletter, I'll be able to resume reading it.

I hope this article has whetted your appetite to learn more about the state-wide UMC and how our beloved church fits into the overall picture.

Constitution Alive!

Classes Starting in August

Have you had enough already?! The GOP and Democratic parties have spoken and given us six of one and a half-dozen of the other. In other words, neither is worth having! Church Directory Options

We need your input! Do YOU want an updated, hard copy church directory?

It's been nearly 4 years since we published our last hard-cover church directory. Recently we were approached by *Remember Church Directories* to see if we might want to use their commercial services. They schedule a one-half-hour session per family to take photos, then put these into a free directory. They offer one 8" by 10" photo for free, as well as an opportunity to purchase more. Generally, they would schedule one-week sessions (Monday - Friday from 10 am to 5 pm), and then again on Saturday (10 am – 2 pm). In addition, they can offer an online directory if we desire.

Recently, the company that produced our 2012 directory, *LifeTouch*, has proposed they come back and take pictures to produce an updated directory providing similar services as described above.

Of concern is whether members will feel pressured to purchase additional photos from a commercial service. If so, we do have an alternative already available:

Our church database contains the tools to fabricate a directory in real-time. If you have already created a free *ServantKeeper* account, you can view a church directory online, save it (as a .pdf) to your computer's desktop, or print it out.

Since our last commercial directory is now nearly 4 years old, a lot of information has changed. Although we have worked hard to keep the *ServantKeeper* database up to date, it would be very useful to have everyone view their data and update it as well as add a new photo or use an existing one in an online directory.

So, here are the choices for an updated directory:

Do we want to dedicate a week to a commercial company scheduling sessions and taking photos?

Would we want to take our own photos (or use old ones) and enter them into our own church database? (Note that this will require action on everyone's part to enter/verify their data.)

We'll make a decision shortly on how to proceed, and your opinion would be helpful. Please call me or email me with your thoughts on the updated directory.

Our Departments

The Administrative Council

The Administrative Council met on Monday, May 23, 2016 and made a couple of important decisions that affect our church.

1. We now have a Vision Statement: To be a Joyful Church Family that is Crucial to our Community. This is what we will strive to be within 5 years. How do we achieve this? By enhancing our current missions and activities. So to repeat:

Mission Statement: Sharing God's Love Through Action

Vision Statement: To be a Joyful Church Family that is Crucial to our Community

2. Both the Sanctuary and the Family Life Center are showing their ages. We want to improve the appearance of our church complex and let others know we care about our church. The list below is in priority order for funding and execution, along with preliminary cost estimates. <u>None</u> of these projects is included in the current budget, so a financial campaign is being planned, led by Tom Burns and Dwight Kitchens. The goal of the **Campus Revitalization Campaign** is to raise \$65,000 within one year.

Work on each project will begin as money is acquired to complete it. Right now we are anticipating the total cost to be around \$60,200.00. We have a good start with \$20,000 that has already been contributed for two of these tasks. The prioritized projects and our initial cost estimates are:

- 1. Sealing and painting the Sanctuary and Family Life Center (\$22,700)
- 2. Landscaping (\$3,000)
- 3. Redoing the pavement between the Preschool and Sanctuary (\$4,500)
- 4. Buying and installing a new electronic sign (\$30,000)

The Council voted that funds be solicited for the entire **Campus Revitalization Campaign** at one time, rather than piece-meal fund requests for each of the four projects. Donors are requested **not to designate** (ear-mark) **funds for a specific project, but to designate them for "Campus Revitalization"**.

Each project will be started in the order approved, when sufficient funds to complete it are on-hand. Any money left over will be applied to the next project on the list until all the approved work is completed. Any money remaining will be applied to the Reserve Fund for Maintenance and Repair (which is currently unfinanced in the 2016 budget).

Unwanted Visitors in the Sanctuary

Two small termite infestations were discovered recently in the Sanctuary and have been treated. One was in a cabinet in the Choir Room; the cabinet has been removed. Since then the Sanctuary has been inspected and shown to be clear of further termite infestation. Inspections and treatment of other buildings on campus are on-going.

If You Can't Take the Heat . . .

As we go to press, the air conditioner that cools the FLC kitchen hasn't for several weeks. In addition, one of the large FLC air conditioners is broken. We are waiting for Brad Fox to return to the area to diagnose the problems and possibly make the repairs.

[A Unit Meeting is a bi-monthly gathering of members of all UMW Circles and any interested folks, members or not.] Noah's Ark is a not-for-profit organization that provides affordable housing and a supportive community for individuals with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities, ages 18 and over. Jack spoke from the heart and with experience as he and his wife have raised a daughter with special needs.

He addressed the sometimes desperate **need of aging parents to find a loving, Christian environment for their adult child**. There are 2,200 people with developmental disabilities **on a waiting list** for critically needed support services with **little or no funding available**.

Noah's Ark currently has two small facilities and this summer they are opening *The Villages of Noah's Landing*. The Villages is relatively near Lake Gibson UMC, at the end of Melody Lane (off SR 33). They could definitely use monetary donations, but Jack emphasized that what he was really looking for was volunteers. I absolutely believe you would find this to be a meaningful and wonderful experience.
