We begin the Advent season December first, the time when we prepare ourselves for Jesus coming anew into our lives and the world. Just like the first Christmas there is chaos and division in our world, our nation and our communities. As a nation we are divided into red and blue camps among others. We differ in how we respond to immigration reform and other social programs. The government does not seem to be our friend. The gap between the haves and have-nots is growing. Homelessness, depression and addiction are seen running rampant in every community.

Peace on earth and good will toward men is still a crucial need. Just as the angel offered this because of the birth of the Savior, the church today can offer this peace and good will through faith in Jesus. The gift of Jesus is for all who will believe. This Christmas season let us pray for the people of the world to have peace and goodwill toward each other. Let us consciously live in peace and offer that peace as well as civility to others. Let us be the people showing this chaotic world that Jesus is still the key to peace and tranquility.



LGUMC has shown love in action to our neighbors by hanging sox around the church grounds. This "**Pick-a-Pair**" event has provided sox for men, women, and children, for anyone who needs them.

There is a SOX BOX in the narthex where you can put your donations. They will be put in baggies, labeled and hung on clotheslines, bushes and anywhere else where they can be seen.

Last year 157 pairs of men's sox, 77 pairs of ladies' and 139 children's pairs were taken for a total of 373 pairs. **That adds up to a lot of warm feet!** We will hang adult-sized sox on clotheslines and place children's on the shrubs around the church. Ask The UMC: What Do the Candles in Our Advent Wreath Mean?

The Advent wreath was originally a German and Scandinavian home devotional practice used to mark the four weeks of Advent. Although many symbols have been at-

tributed to it since that time, it was originally intended as a way to mark the Advent season and the weeks until Christmas.

Families would light a candle for each past week and the current week at their dinner or evening time of prayer. The configuration of candles, whether in a line or a circle, did not matter. Neither did the color of the candles (all colors are used in homes in Europe). What mattered was the marking of time and the increase of light each week in the face of increasing darkness as the winter solstice approached.

As Advent wreaths began to be used by congregations on Sundays in some places in Europe and America beginning in the late19th century, adaptations were needed for the larger worship spaces. Candles needed to be larger and more specialized than the "daily candles" handmade or purchased for home use. They also needed to be more uniform in color to fit with other decor in the sanctuary. Purple (and more recently blue) has become the basic color of the candles to coordinate with color of the paraments [the linens and cloth hangings used on communion tables, altars, pulpits and lecterns] this season.

As Advent wreaths changed from practical, private use to the more symbolic context of public worship, it became important for the candles to have meaning rather than simply mark time and add light. Ceremonies were developed around the lighting of the candles each week.

In time there was an effort, largely spurred by church supply houses that sold the special candles and wreaths, to provide a particular meaning to each candle. The themes of

Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace became popular, based on scriptures from the one-year lectionaries used at that time. However, the historic theme of Advent is broader and deeper than any one-word theme can capture.

So what are we to say, then, about the meaning of the Advent wreath today? We can still draw meaning from its original home use: to mark time while increasing light. Advent, the first season of the Christian year, is all about time.

We await the day described in Revelation 21:23 when, "The city doesn't need the sun or the moon to shine on it, because God's glory is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb."

At Christmas we celebrate that in Christ, *"The true light that shines on all people was coming into the world"* (John 1:9).

Silence in Church, Part 2

[Editor: In the November issue of *The Good News* I wrote an opinion piece titled "Food for Thought" on the subject of **being silent and reverent in the sanctuary** before the worship service starts, suggesting that people visit with friends in the FLC before or after the service. The response below provides insight on the good this socializing accomplishes. What do you think?]

Let's look at both sides. Yes, perhaps we should sit quietly and be in the presence of God prior to the beginning of Sunday service in our sanctuary. Here are some of my thoughts and maybe we can compromise:

First - What about those who never go to the FLC, but are there for most Sunday services? Some of these folks scoot out the door quickly after the service. Prior to the service is the time the congregation can reach out to them.

Second - There are some who have illnesses, hardships, family needs, attend alone or maybe Sunday service is one of the very few places they can go during the week. It seems by giving them what I call the "eye-toeye/heart-to-heart fellowship" (by a tender handshake, smile and a few kind words) would mean the world to them.

Third - What about the impression of those who are attending Lake Gibson for the first time? How do we want them to assess our congregation? Do they want quiet or do they come to be welcomed as one of our family?

Fourth - What about those who may not get to attend our service ever again, either by moving, driving restrictions, illness and such? How do we want them to remember our church: quiet or joyous (as our banner states); cold or warm?

Last - How does God want His house of worship to be? This may be the only place in the week folks can find peace, joy, fellowship, caring, comfort, music, prayer and a strong hold on God's Word, all wrapped up into one

large package to take home with them for the week.

There may be some who just like to slip in and find a quiet spot to meditate on God's word in quiet, and their wishes should be respected.

In 2018 by supporting the Polk County food bag project you helped provide 182 food bags. The UMW and other Church members were also instrumental in the filling and delivery of these bags.

In 2019 144 bags were delivered -- plus 4. This year 4 exceptional students were helping stuff the duffel bags the seniors receive. Asia helped me put the last of the candy in the food bags. She kept repeating, "This is so much food!" (Food was packed in a 2-gallon baggie).

I was told these 4 students were also hungry. I asked if they could receive a bag if we had extra. God had been telling me to make extra bags. We <u>never</u> have extra food bags! We know the total number of bags needed and that is what we pack. God blessed us with the <u>4 extra bags</u> we needed for these volunteers.

Guardian Ad Litem Christmas project for teens: We are given the neediest of the needy. Last year we provided gifts, clothes, shoes and toiletries to 23 teens plus extra gift baskets for teens coming into the system over the holidays. Yes, they even come in on Christmas day.

We go out on faith when we pick the number of teens, and God always provides the funds or needs for our teens. This year we have 16 teens. (They always call to see if we can take lastminute emergencies.) Three of the 16 are the sisters removed from human trafficking. Many of you are helping make their lives a little happier.

When you give you usually don't realize the scope of your donations. Just look at these numbers and know that you touched many more lives than you ever thought possible. When a teen says, "You mean someone that doesn't even know me did this for me?" you can be assured your donation was appreciated. God bless you for your donations and the many lives you have touched through the years.

Rick Nelson opened for Breakfast today, offering our guests beef and cheese tortillas, a variety of cereals with milk, pastries, turnovers and donuts. The drink options were fresh hot coffee, Sunny D, and cold milk.
