From the Pastor's Desk

We begin a new year and a new decade this month, and I dare say most of us are ready for something new. We are tired of the rhetoric and politics that seem to be involved in everything. We want people and officials to work together for the common good of our society and world. We want to see our churches promoting the love of Jesus and the Gospel of peace. Yet 2020 is more than likely to be a year of turmoil and division as we hold a presidential election in the U.S., and within the United Methodist Church we hold a General Conference. Both the country and the church are deeply divided and in turmoil.

I want to point us to the Word of God. God says in Isaiah 43: <sup>9</sup>I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?

New things occur when old things disappear or become cumbersome or difficult to use. It is not easy for some of us to adapt to new things. Remember the first cell (bag) phones or computers? Few people wanted one, yet now we all have phones that are smarter than the first computers. God is doing something new; that does not mean He changes His word. Church is changing, numbers are declining in worship service attendance, but many people today watch online or live-stream church.

Many worship venues are now not in a church building, but are held in store fronts, homes, work places, hotels and even bars. Is God doing something new by taking His word into the streets where people need to hear and feel His presence? (Or is this really Pentecost occurring in a new setting?) Many of us fear the New Year and what it holds, but our trust is in the God of all ages and not our government or mankind or an organization.

I point out to the church that we are *in* this world but not *of* it, and that our hope is found in the resurrected Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul, who also lived in perilous times, told his protégée this: 2 Timothy 1:7 (NRSV) <sup>7</sup> for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

We were reminded at Christmas that our God is Emmanuel, a God that is with us always. In this new decade let us as believers of Christ allow God's Holy Spirit to fill us in the power of God's love, and then may we take that love into the world where it is desperately needed, and watch the miraculous transformation God brings about.



## **Update of Key Holders**

Every January people who have keys to any of the church structures must bring their keys into the office to update their key forms.

### **2019 Food Pantry Report**

Lake Gibson UMC blessed the needy this year with **839 bags of groceries and 871 bags of Publix baked goods.** For comparison, in 2018 we gave out 709 bags of groceries and 802 bags of baked goods.

For *groceries* the least demand was experienced in June and July (both 49 bags), while the high, 101 bags, was in August, driven by Hurricane Dorian. Our food pantry was open 50 of the 52 weeks of 2019 (closed July 4th and Thanksgiving). The average number of groceries given out was just under 17 bags per week.

For *Publix baked goods*, the low demand was in July (50) and the high in December (105). The average given out was slightly over 17 bags per week.

The Food Pantry staff currently consists of Marina Hernandez (records the tally, identifies shortfalls, packs grocery bags, and provides overall advice and management) and volunteers Ann and Dan Johnson and Ruth Zona. Ruth and Phyllis Kitchens serve our needy on the first Thursday of the month, while Ann and Dan serve the 2nd, 4th and 5th Thursdays. On the 3rd Thursday, Nancy Smith and Sharon Coddington serve.

Ann and Dan buy the dry goods when donations fall short, while Yvonne and Todd Bower continue to buy the meat. Donations of money by individuals and church organizations like the UMW and its circles, as well as funds identified in the general budget, keep the pantry going. Continued . . .

Food pantry hours are between 9:30 and 11:30 am on Thursdays. Other days and times can be honored in the event of emergencies with the Pastor's approval.

Bell ringing is a wonderful way to share Christ's love in our local neighborhood! This "work" brings joy to the volunteers and to passers-by. What a delight it is to be able to smile and say "Merry Christmas" to people! We'll be doing this again in December 2020 -- please consider joining our cadre of happy ringers!

## **December at Hope Center**

[The following paragraphs were extracted from Debbie McLellan's Tuesday reports which she writes to inform other volunteers and supporters of what she and Rick did, problems with the equipment, shortfalls in supplies, etc. This information is presented here to inform our congregation of the types of goods and services needed, as well as the volunteer activities people in LGUMC and others provide. We hope you will be inspired to donate to and/or volunteer at Hope Center.]

#### December 3rd, 2019

At Lunchtime, Rick McLellan led our guests in prayer and a devotion from 2 Corinthians 5, THE DOOR OF RECONCILIATION. Then Debbie and Rick served about 15 guests sloppy joes, green beans, individual bags of Lays potato chips and cupcakes for dessert. Egg salad sandwiches in individual bags were available for take-out. We also sent out about ten to-go plates. To quench thirst was coffee, milk, orange juice and iced tea.

The ice machine worked well and the shower was busy all day, as were the washers and dryers. We gave out about 12 pair of new socks, razors, deodorants, lip balms and toiletry items, and some special requests, including 4 camping lanterns, batteries and a back pack. Each guest received 2 easy-open pop-top cans and other items for supper.

We brought John Milliken with us, who is from Belfast, Northern Ireland and is involved in a similar ministry there. He enjoyed talking with our guests today. We also had a visit from Jim Aldrich from Christ the King Episcopal Church who brought cookies, cake and some clothing donations. We also had a number of other clothing donations. Thank you to all our Christian friends who enable us to minister to guests in need.

#### **December 10th**

Rick Nelson, Marshall and Grover opened for Breakfast today, offering our guests scrambled eggs, sausage links, pancakes and a variety of cereal with milk, and donuts and pastries. The drink options were fresh hot coffee, orange juice and cold milk.

It was a very hot day for December. The ice machine worked well. The shower was busy all day, as were the washers and dryers. Today we brought some men's and women's clothes and socks. Most were needed sizes and went to guests immediately. We also brought 49 pop-top canned foods, including spaghetti and meatballs, ravioli, etc. We gave out a number of batteries for camping lanterns and lights, mostly AA and AAA. Each guest received 2 easy-open pop-top cans and other items for supper and many health and toiletry items.

### **Hidden Realities**

Our costs for both Property and Liability Insurance (P&LI) are increasing significantly during FY 2020. Insurance firms have taken a beating with hurricanes and tornados roaring across Florida in the past few years.

The **Property Insurance portion** of our coverage is anticipated to increase by approximately 30% for FY 2020. Our **General Liability Insurance** covers such items as employee theft, employment practice claims, trip-and-fall accidents, sexual misconduct claims and everincreasing jury awards. The industry overall has seen huge claims which must be covered by premiums.

At Lake Gibson UMC, we anticipate premium increases of approximately **40% for FY 2020.** Last year, we budgeted \$17,000 for P&LI. We might see an **increase of \$6,800 this year on insurance costs alone.** 

Why does this matter? Well, unlike many European countries, there is no state-sponsored religion and no religious tax in the United States. Worshipers must cover the costs of keeping their doors open. Yes, costs increase each year, possibly disproportionately to income increases.

There are secular bills which our church must pay in order to perform our mission. If you have not found it in your heart to increase your contributions to God's work each year, something is wrong. Our priorities should insure that our church remains a viable beacon of hope to our community.
