Bishop Carter recommends no public worship through May 15

A Pastoral Letter to the People of the Florida Conference

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Thank you for your patience and faithfulness in this season of COVID-19. This virus is very real. We have lost members to death. We are watching and praying as friends and family members have contracted the virus. We have been unable to gather in our sanctuaries. We carry the stress, anxiety and fear within our bodies. And yet, to quote the words of one of my mentors, Ken Callahan, "We are the people of the empty tomb, the risen Lord, the new life in Christ. We are the Easter people. We are the people of hope."

The crucified and risen Lord asked the disciple Peter a question, three times. "*Do you love me?*" When Peter responded, affirmatively, Jesus replied, "*Feed my sheep*" (John 21).

We love our Lord by caring for his people. We love God by loving our neighbor (Matthew 22).

And now we love our neighbors by flattening the curve (the effect and spread of the virus). Many of our neighbors and members are more senior adults, the most vulnerable and among our most dedicated. We love them and honor them by flattening the curve. We save lives by flattening the curve.

Many of our members who live on the margins are among our most dedicated and are most vulnerable. Their illnesses are often unreported.

We are the second oldest state in average age. Illnesses in many elder care facilities and nursing homes in Florida are often unreported.

We do not yet have testing to know if we ourselves might carry the illness to those we meet and serve.

A pandemic is not about political partisanship. I offered guidance as your bishop twenty-two days prior to that of the state government. This guidance is grounded in the great commandments of Jesus. Right now we love God by loving our neighbors. If you are a clergy in leadership, this is what you were licensed, commissioned and ordained to do—to feed the sheep, to seek their safety, to love God's people.

This is a mindset change for many of us, who have spent our lives assembling congregations in order to offer love for God. When we know it is safe--when there is testing that is widespread and available—we will reassemble. It will be a day of rejoicing.

For now, and through May 15, we will offer worship via technology. Hundreds of our churches, large and small, are faithfully bearing witness in this way. Thank you for the creative and innovative ways you are sharing the gospel.

Be assured of my prayers and gratitude for you. In this time of distancing and at times isolation, we are a connection.

What Does Our Future Look Like?

Our church constantly faces a hostile world. Faith in God may not have dwindled among the populace, but the number attending worship has over the past few decades. Now, it is worse than ever with large gatherings being limited. Our faith should not necessarily overcome our common sense. We are going to be facing trying times over the next few years.

Our way out of the current coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic will take place in phases, with the possibility of setbacks along the way. Whether we're talking of gatherings of up to 10 people, or later gatherings of up to 50 people, sanctuaries across the nation will have to adapt to this new reality of maintaining six-foot distances (or perhaps more) from other worshipers. It may be a very long time before we can worship together as we once did with packed pews.

Thankfully, streaming video of church services is now available from Lake Gibson UMC. We currently stream to our "Lake Gibson United Methodist Church" Facebook account. So, each Sunday at 10:30 am you can see our live worship service. Little is missing except the walk from the parking lot into the sanctuary. We are working to get the same service onto our website at <u>www.LakeGibsonUMC.com</u> and onto a new YouTube channel.

But, for our church to survive, we must continue to be financially supported. Each offering has always represented your faith in the Great Commission of Making Disciples of Jesus Christ. We strive to introduce both strangers and acquaintances to the love of Jesus. Our fellowship strengthens our ability to carry on.

Comparing the month of March 2019 to March 2020, we see a near \$3,000 reduction in offerings. During these times of remote worship, it is imperative that we continue to support our church financially.

Our church has multiple means by which this can be accomplished from the safety of your home. For those with computers, you can go to <u>www.LakeGibsonUMC.com</u> and make offerings, either one-time or recurring. We've recently

Blessing Bags

Due to circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 virus, it has been necessary to suspend operations inside the Hope Center on U.S. Route 98.

This has left the participants "out in the cold" for many essential services. Those who previously volunteered have looked for an alternative means of providing support.

One means is by **providing both food and hygiene items in bags** which may be given out on a one-on-one basis. Here are suggestions as to the type of items requested. Due to limits on availability, use your imagination and provide what you can.

Food items for 2 days:

Pop-top cans (stews, soups, pasta, etc.) Vienna sausages

Tuna or chicken salad kits

Small, to-go containers of peanut butter

Sandwich crackers (Lance, Nabs, etc.)

Granola bars

Fruit cups/non-refrigerated puddings Individual packets of instant tea or Crystal Light

Razor blades Deodorant Body powder Face wipes

St. Vincent de Paul CARES Serving Hope Center

Until recently Hope Center volunteers, including our own Debbie and Rick McLellan, have provided food, some clothing, access to washers and dryers and hot showers from three to five days a week. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul CARES has stepped in temporarily to fill the gap until Hope Center reopens.

St. Vincent de Paul CARES operates on a grant to provide services and assistance to the homeless. On Tuesdays and Fridays, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm, they set up on the north side of the Hope Center and provide a mobile shower unit with body wash, shampoo, toiletries and towels. Here's a report on their April 14th service at Hope Center:

"Last Tuesday, April 14, 2020, St. Vincent de Paul CARES was able to feed 34 people with lunches. The lunches were purchased from Lakeland BBQ Co. and consisted of pulled pork or chicken, baked beans and potato salad. We also hosted *Showered and Empowered* who brought their mobile shower unit. Eleven (11) people chose to utilize their services. They also distributed bags of bagels to anyone who wanted one.

"We prayed over everything and asked that God would bless those in need. We were also able to purchase some clothes and shoes for those that were in need and had not received something already. We are grateful to the Hope House for allowing us to minister to those in need and to everyone who has worked so diligently in service out there. We will be out again Friday with lunches from the Edge Cafe and a different mobile shower unit. We are planning to return next Tuesday with lunches as well and are looking into the possibility/ need of regular shower units. May God bless you always and keep you all safe during this trying time."

Feed My Sheep

After Hurricane Irma, Sue Shelton, who was then our Lay Leader, and Beverly Ellis proposed that our church formalize a contact program to check on everyone after a natural disaster. Since Sue has moved to Colorado, Beverly took over the leadership of Lake Gibson's **Shepherding program**.

So far there is no formal description of how the Shepherding program operates. For now a number of volunteers have agreed to be shepherds. Sue and Beverly assigned church members to each shepherd largely based on proximity to where they lived. During an emergency like we are currently experiencing, the shepherds are requested to call their sheep and check on their well-being. If there are needs identified, the shepherd can take care of them, and/or relay them to Pastor Steve.

Loans for Church Continuity

Back in February, as we discussed closing down church services, we also talked about how we would cut expenses with an anticipated loss of revenue. During January through March, our general account saw a decrease in revenue of \$8,335 as opposed to 2019. We decided that we did not want to put any of our employees on the unemployment line. Thankfully, the Federal Government offered the CARES Act, which gives individuals/families a one-time payment, and also offers a Payroll Protection Program under the Small Business Administration (SBA) which helps small businesses for a two-month period.

As the church (LGUMC) and A Little Bit of Heaven Child Enrichment Center (ALBOH) are two separate business entities for payroll purposes, we took action to apply for two Payroll Protection Program loans, which with some management, may be totally forgiven.

LGUMC looked for a local lender to accept our application. Unfortunately, LGUMC moved its business to the United Methodist Connectional Federal Credit Union (UMCFCU) a number of years ago due to increasing banking fees. Since we had no business relationship with any bank, we could not initially find a bank willing to accept our SBA loan application. The UMCFCU did not have a relationship with the SBA and initially was unable to accept our application. Therefore, we found an out-of-state bank, Cross River Bank in New Jersey, which was willing to accept the application.

A loan for LGUMC was approved and funded on 21 April. It will cover 58 days of salaries and utility bills (up to 25% of our salaries). LGUMC has established a separate checking account so that we can accurately track expenses under this program. We anticipate that the entire loan may be forgiven by the SBA under the CARES Act.

ALBOH's loan is being processed by BB&T. They had an existing business relationship with BB&T and were eligible to apply. AL-BOH was not funded during the first round of the program. As of 27 April, the second round of SBA funding is opening up. We are anticipating that we will be able to get a loan during May as our application is already in BB&T's queue with the SBA. This will significantly help us as the enrollment of ALBOH has dropped significantly as many parents and children have sheltered in place.

We hope that this helps both organizations weather the coronavirus pandemic with the minimum of disruption to the lives of our employees. But, the church still relies on offerings to insure our vitality now and after this pandemic is over. Please, do your part by supporting our congregation, both through worship, testimony, and contributions.
