From the Pastor

Pews or Chairs? Hymns or Praise Songs? Or Something else?

We have been dealing with this pandemic of COVID-19 for ONE year this month. For one year we have either suspended in-person worship or been limited by social distancing and other requirements. Yet even in the midst of this pandemic, or any other catastrophe, the church has the mission to make Disciples for Jesus Christ and thus transform the world. The mission is not put on hold because of the pandemic or anything else. The mission is what is important – not what I may like or want. The mission is found in the last words Jesus gave to his Disciples in Matthew 28:19-20:

<sup>19</sup> Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. (NRSV)

On one wall in my office I have 9 handmade cards from children given to me on Pastor Appreciation Sunday a couple of years ago. I have not had any real interaction with those children since COVID struck. They are not here for various reasons and I miss seeing them around. Even before COVID we lamented the lack of young families and younger adults within our congregation.

I have had honest conversations with people in these age groups and asked them would they consider coming to our church, and after hemming and hawing around, they say probably not. I ask why? They are uncomfortable in the church setting. Why, I ask? Here are some of the answers:

I feel judged when I walk in the door.

People don't accept me for me – they want me to be like them.

I am not comfortable with the setting, the pews, the dress, the music, the strict atmosphere, the time of worship or the style of it.

I don't agree with your politics (which should not be part of the church) and on and on.

I look at my own family with all of the cousins we have. Most do not go to church, even though our grandparents actually donated land for the church and served on committees and as Sunday School teachers. Their children, (my parents' generation) were about half-and-half dedicated to the church. My generation was less involved, my children's generation even less, and my grandkids not much at all.

I have had conversations with nephews, nieces, grandkids and others of their generations and gotten the answers you read above. Yet my mission as a follower of Jesus is still to reach them, to find a way to communicate the love of Jesus to them. How can I do that if they don't like to set foot in my house (the church)?

Would I be willing to change the décor, the music, the looks of the venue to reach my kids and grandkids with Christ's love? Yes, I would; for them to be in love with Jesus and involved with a church would be great. Maybe we need to be asking ourselves this question: "What would I be willing to give up to reach my grandchildren for Christ?" If we would implement those changes would we make a difference in our world? Food for thought.

#### **Financial Report**

Thanks to all those who have been supporting Lake Gibson UMC financially throughout this COVID-19 pandemic. While many are attending church remotely, our ability to pay our bills and enhance our church's capabilities has continued.

Of course, taking advantage of the Paycheck Protection Program during 2020 certainly helped with an infusion of \$25,235. This salary offset helped us make a significant investment in audio and video equipment to put our service on streaming media. We've added computers capable of streaming our service, enhanced our sound mixer, as well as added new microphones, cameras, wiring, etc.

This year we are working on replacing most of our aged lighting with LED fixtures. We have been working on this for a several months now and have a few more locations to go. You should soon notice new speakers in the sanctuary to improve what you hear.

We've recently installed a point-tilt-zoom camera in classrooms 1 and 2 of the Family Life Center. Currently, we are broadcasting Sue Heishman's Sunday School class across Zoom to members who are staying at home. You can join in through free Zoom software installed on your device on Sundays from 9:15 – 10:15 am using Meeting ID: 834 9800 2155.

Our Property and Liability Insurance was paid in full during February. This permitted us to receive a 2% discount on the insurance portion of the bill. As mentioned last month, the Conference used investments to absorb a two million dollar increase in premiums, rather than prorating it among the churches within the conference.

#### Rev. Dr. Candace Lewis, Gulf Central District Superintendent,

#### **Elected President-Dean of Gammon Theological Seminary**



Bishop L. Jonathan Holston, Chair of the Board of Trustees of Gammon Theological Seminary and Resident Bishop of the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church announces the **election of Dr. Candace M. Lewis as the President-Dean of Gammon**. Dr. Lewis will be Gammon's first female President-Dean and the first female denominational Dean in the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) consortium, ushering in a new chapter at Gammon and for the ITC community. **She will begin her tenure April 1, 2021**.

Dr. Lewis is an ordained elder in the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church. From 1997- 2009, Dr. Lewis was appointed as the founding pastor and served the New Life Community UMC, Jacksonville, FL. She was then appointed as the Associate General Secretary in the New Church Starts Division and later as the Executive

Director of Path1 New Church Starts at the General Board of Discipleship in Nashville, Tenn. She comes to Gammon after serving as a District Superintendent for 4 years in the Florida Conference.

She is a graduate of the University of Florida and Gammon Theological Seminary – ITC where she received her Master of Divinity degree in May 1996. In June 2000, she graduated from the Harvard Divinity School's Summer Leadership Institute on Faith-Based Community Economic Development. She earned a Doctorate in Ministry in Church Leadership Excellence from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. May 2014.

#### **Gulf Central District Leadership**

Dr. Lewis' district responsibilities will be divided between Director of Missional Engagement, Rev. Clarke Campbell-Evans, and Director of Connectional and Justice Ministries, Rev. Dr. Sharon Austin, through December 31, 2021.

"Dr. Sharon Austin and Rev. Clarke Campbell-Evans are respected leaders in the Florida Conference", Bishop Ken Carter commented. "Both have experience as superintendents, Clarke in the former Miami District and Sharon in the former South Central District. The church is in a moment of transition in many ways—living through COVID, impending decisions about denominational structure - and in consultation with a number of leaders, it seemed best to care for our near-term missional needs in this way. I am deeply grateful to Sharon and Clarke for their willingness to serve in this way alongside their duties in Missional Engagement and Connectional Ministries, respectively. I give thanks for their flexibility and I know their leadership will be a blessing to the churches of the Gulf Central District."

Dr. Lewis noted, "I will miss serving, innovating and growing with our amazing Gulf Central District staff, Maggie and Beth, and our pastors and laity. I am grateful for the blessings and full support of Bishop Carter, the Florida Conference Cabinet, and staff as I answer this call of servant leadership in theological education. Informed by my season of ministry here, inspired by the changing landscape of ministry, and walking faithfully with God, I believe Gammon Seminary, its students, staff and trustees will be led into a prosperous future."

### Examples of One Earth Film Festival Films March 5th - 15th

Some films are marked as appropriate for children, youth and/or young adult. The following descriptions (all suitable for adults) are just a few of the 20 movies and discussion sessions offered:

#### Flint: Who Can You Trust?

Anthony Baxter, (2020), 119 min (Social Justice, Water, People & Cultures, Health)

Saturday, March 6, 6:30 pm CST/7:30 pm EST

FILM DESCRIPTION: Filmed over 5 years and long after the story was front-page news, "Flint: Who Can You Trust?" is full of new twists and turns.

Journalist/filmmaker Anthony Baxter goes beyond the headlines in Flint, Michigan, where a government poisoned its own citizens' water supply, to show the complete breakdown of authority, public trust and faith in the truth itself. "Flint" is a powerful investigation of the breathtaking scope of toxic pseudo-science, celebrity activism, and official negligence. The film reveals the devastating impact on poor people and people of color, which make up the majority of the residents in Flint, as they continue to seek justice and clean water. Featuring Marc Ruffalo and narrated by Alec Baldwin. Produced by Richard Phinney and Sabrina Schmidt Gordon.

#### Dammed to Extinction

Michael Peterson and Steven Hawley, (2019), 51 mins (Water, Wildlife)

Wednesday, March 10, 6:30 pm CST/7:30 EST

FILM DESCRIPTION: For eons, a one-of-a-kind population of killer whales has hunted chinook salmon along the Pacific Coast of the United States. For the last 40 years, renowned whale scientist Ken Balcomb has closely observed them. He's familiar with a deadly pattern: as salmon numbers plummet, the whales starve.

These important mammals need roughly a million salmon a year. Where can we find them? The solution, says Balcomb, is getting rid of four fish-killing dams 500 miles away on the largest tributary to what once was the largest chinook producing river on earth. *This film will follow "Mermaids Against Plastic."* 

#### Mermaids against Plastic: Tamara

Sylvia Johnson (2020) 10 min (Waste, Water, Health, Wildlife)

Wednesday, March 10, 6:30 pm CST/7:30 pm EST

FILM DESCRIPTION: This is a short film revealing the extent of the **marine plastic pollution problem in the Mexican Caribbean**. The film follows a diver as she searches for solutions to protect the ocean she loves. Tamara is from the ocean and water runs in her veins. Born in a fishing village on the Mexican coast, she returned to her roots to become a full-time scuba instructor. When she discovers plastic in her beloved ocean, she sets out to get the diving industry to stop using single use plastic. *This film will precede "Dammed to Extinction."*

# First UMC Lakeland Looking into Virtual Mission Trips

The pandemic forced us to cancel short-term mission trips in 2020 to serve in South Florida, Costa Rica and Haiti and, of course, we remain in a holding pattern. With that in mind, our Mission Trips Committee has been meeting to explore virtual mission trips to help our congregation learn more about our ministry partners and consider joining teams to serve with them once we can travel without COVID-19 concerns.

I met via Zoom on February 10 with **Wil Bailey**, the missionary we support in Costa Rica. We're in the process of scheduling a virtual mission trip with his **Costa Rica Mission Projects (CRMP) ministry**, likely to fall toward the **end of April**.

Wil has put together such virtual trips for the Southeastern Jurisdiction and for individual churches. I've served with CRMP twice and it's a life-changing ministry. Lord willing, we will be able to take a team to serve there early in 2022.

Keep an eye on First United Methodist communications for dates and details about this virtual mission trip opportunity. We're also exploring ways to offer **virtual mission trips to Cuba and Haiti** later in 2021.

### A Request for Children's COVID-19 Facemasks

Last summer Cornerstone Family Ministries (CFM) received over **800 COVID-19 children's facemasks** in response to their request to Tampaarea churches. By the time Lake Gibson UMC learned of the request, the required number of masks already had been received.

Those facemasks have mostly been used up, and new masks are requested (some are used by children at the Rosa Valdez Center and some by children enrolled in other childcare centers, including some in Polk County).

The following information was provided by CFM:

"We prefer the ones with the [elastic] ear loops, NOT the ones that tie. This pattern has a few sizes. The one we need is the smallest one, for toddlers, 2- to 5-years-old.

Please leave your masks in the church office. Phyllis or Dwight Kitchens (863-984-4564) will pick them up and deliver them to CFM. It is suggested that masks be delivered to the office by March 31st.

"Print off this fitted face mask sewing pattern and make your own masks that fit your face comfortably! This homemade fitted mask is contoured around the nose and is less bulky than a pleated mask. Pattern Includes 5 sizes for children and adults."

#### **Should Christians be Political?**

Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary Intern, Amanda Holmes reminds us of our Christian call to engage in the political world through our Wesleyan traditions and the UMC Social Principles.

As I find myself in my second semester of my internship where I witnessed an election, a new Congress, and an inauguration, I find myself in the midst of discussions that frequently come up in the church -- the question of should the church and/or Christians be political. To engage in this question, I always find it helpful to begin with a mutual understanding of what we are talking about. **Political is defined as: "relating to the government or the public affairs of a country; or interested in or active in politics."** To dive more deeply into this question, I employ the use of the Wesleyan quadrilateral and consider its four aspects: Scripture, Tradition, Reason, and Experience. Reflecting on myself as a United Methodist, I want to consider what our UMC tradition says about this, particularly looking at our baptismal vows and Social Principles.

From the time we are welcomed into the church, our baptismal vows ask if you "...accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves... and serve as Christ's representatives in the world?" As an advocate for justice, I take this vow very seriously and recognize that evil, injustice and oppression are very real in our world in a blatantly visible and tangible way. In accepting the vow to serve as Christ's representatives in the world, it is my belief that I must engage in advocacy reflecting my faith and that faith calls me toward social justice for all people. Interning with [the United Methodist Church's General Board of] Church and Society, I also rely on our Social Principles to guide me in the ways that I move not only as a Christian, but as a United Methodist. Our Social Principles are inherently political when you consider the definition of "relating to the government or public affairs of a country." Our Social Principles guide us in the ways we should respond to and engage with the world around us.

One of the things that most attracted me to the United Methodist Church is found in the beginning of the Social Principles, that the church has a "long history of concern for social justice" and this has been historically demonstrated through the church's work in the world. In an effort to "speak to the human issues in the contemporary world," the Social Principles guide us as United Methodists in working toward "societies in which each person's value is recognized, maintained and strengthened."

I cannot imagine a way to do this that does not involve getting political, or "interested or active in politics," as the government guides and affects so much of our daily lives. The Social Principles directly note that we are part of a political community and not only that, but that we are "responsible to God for social and political life." I think throughout all the Social Principles the idea that most directly stands out to me and guides my work as a social justice advocate is under <a href="Political Responsibility">Political Responsibility</a>: "The church should continually exert a strong ethical influence upon the state, supporting policies and programs deemed to be just and opposing policies and programs that are deemed to be unjust."

Throughout my time thus far at seminary and my time interning with Church and Society, I feel that in order to "serve as Christ's representatives in the world," we must be willing to directly engage with the world and cannot afford to not make a statement when we see or experience evil, injustice, and oppression. Engagement looks different for us all -- some are called to *grassroots community organizing, some to advocacy with legislators, and some to work behind the scenes*, but we are all called to engage. So, I invite you to be political while also remembering that above all else we are called to the two greatest commandments: love God and love your neighbor as yourself. Come join me in doing justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly with God.

### No More Donations for Rummage Sale Until October, Please

This may be the first time in the history of Lake Gibson UMC, but we **cannot accept ANY more donations** for future Sidewalk or Rummage Sales. All of our storage facilities are packed to the rafters - and some beyond.

We are hoping that the COVID1-19 positivity rate will be low enough in the fall to allow us to use the FLC for a rummage sale in October. If not, we will do another Sidewalk Sale, but due to the limited outdoor display space, they don't reduce our inventory of donated goods as much as the indoors Rummage Sale does.

The UMW is very grateful for the way our congregation and neighbors have supported these fund-raising sales. Money raised is used to fund local charitable organizations; as such, your donations make a positive impact in our community.

We hope that everyone will understand that the church has reached the limit of its storage space and we're not just being "picky" about what items we accept.



### Is a Stimulus Check in Your Future? Consider Donating to LGUMC

What's with this economic relief plan? What if you don't actually need a stimulus to survive? Well, the intent is certainly to get the economy rolling by helping those in financial need. It will assist numerous unemployed persons with relief on mortgages, rental payments, putting food on the table, etc. And, it is not taxable income, so you get to spend all of it.

Unfortunately, it does not help if we merely put it into a savings account. That does not maintain employment, keep restaurants open, keep stores open. We need to get that money into the economy where the multiplier effect insures that it reaches many more people.

As you may know, your church is looking to purchase a number of items in the near term. **These** are items for which we have not previously set funds aside.

- 1. The FLC needs a **new double-door refrigerator** to replace ours which died during February not a cheap date.
- 2. We're still looking to acquire **two additional cameras for the sanctuary** (\$4,800). These are all items we could acquire quickly and put to immediate use.
- 3. A Little Bit of Heaven (ALBOH) could certainly use **additional reserve funds** as they continued to pay salaries for employees sent home with COVID-19 while closing four of six classrooms during February.
- 4. Since ALBOH is using our old Sunday School building which lacks water in many classrooms, they require a **replacement working handwashing station in one of the classrooms (\$1,300**).
- 5. A replacement automated entrance door (approximately \$6,000) is also on ALBOH's longer -term needs.

So, if you don't really need a stimulus check, we know of a number of worthwhile purposes to which it could be directed. Write a check to LGUMC and annotate to what purpose you want it to support. We'll insure that your request is honored. It may take us a little time to gather enough contributions to acquire your chosen item, but we'll do it as quickly as possible.

#### **UMC Condemns Recent Attacks on Asian American Elderly**

On the January 28, 2021 84-year-old Vicha Ratanapakdee was shoved to the ground while taking his morning walk in San Francisco, California. Just two days after the assault, he died. A 64-year-old Vietnamese grandmother was assaulted and robbed in San Jose, California. A 91-year-old man was caught on camera being thrown to the ground in Oakland's Chinatown. There has been upwards of 20 other violent attacks and robberies reported since January 2021. A 61-year-old Filipino man's face was slashed with a box cutter while he rode a New York City subway. The NYPD reported that hate crimes motivated by anti-Asian sentiment jumped 1,900% in New York City in 2020.

Violence against Asian Americans sharply increased in March [2020] as COVID-19 began spreading across the country, and some politicians blamed China for the pandemic. It was back in March 2020 that Professor Russell Jeung, chair of the Asian American studies department at San Francisco State University, created a tool that tracks hate incidents against Asian American Pacific Islander communities Stop AAPI Hate tracker. Stop AAPI Hate has received more than 2,800 firsthand reports of anti-Asian hate across 47 states and Washington, DC, since March 19, 2020 [when data collection began].
