From the Pastor

This year Easter will be a real celebration. After a year-long battle with the COVID-19 virus, a nasty political fight still lingering in some ways, a floundering economy and the racial discord dividing America, we are ready for some good news and Easter gives us that.

Easter is in the first week of April this year, so it is a Communion Sunday. We will be celebrating the Lord's Supper the same day we rejoice in the Resurrection. Hallelujah!!! The words we use, "His blood shed for the remission of sin" and "His body broken for us" will have an even greater meaning this year because they are used on Easter Sunday.

The hope that is experienced by Christians as they view the empty tomb is shared with the world as they see a vaccination for the virus becoming available to all people. This year I think we can all relate to Mary Magdalene. She was crushed, dejected, and crest-fallen; she had witnessed her Lord crucified. He had been abused, ridiculed, shamed and nailed to a cross with criminals and died. She wished it had been her rather than him. She felt empty, lost. All she could see was total darkness, much like us in the world today.

We have lost far too many people to this virus. The entire world has experienced grief, sorrow and darkness because of it. Every one of us have a family member, a friend or close acquaintance that has been affected by the virus. We all have had at least one negative experience with the political process and many have felt the sting of hatred due to racism.

Mary goes to the tomb that first Easter morning and finds the tomb empty. I am positive this is another shock to her. She assumed the worst and why wouldn't she after what has happened? She jumps to the conclusion that someone stole Jesus' body to farther humiliate him and his followers. The other shoe just dropped for Mary. Then two men in white (angels) appeared to her – don't you know right now her heart is beating a mile a minute, only the grace of God kept her from fainting. They tell her Jesus is alive – which she cannot comprehend. In the Gospel of John a gardener (which is in reality Jesus) appears to her and she begs him to tell her where the body is. Much like many of us have begged for mercy in the past year. Mercy to help us get through these tough times and over the tragedy that has plagued us. When Jesus speaks her name, she recognizes it is the Lord.

This Easter may each of us hear Jesus call our name and may we realize that God is here with us, among us, and in us. May the assurance of the Resurrection, the light of the world, the very Spirit of God, live in us and in our churches to transform the world through God's love.

Please Help Homeless Graduating Seniors

The celebration is on again this year for Polk's homeless high school graduates. These students are under the care of the Hearth Project of the Polk County school system. These seniors may or may not have family members to live with. Some may live on their own, in shelters or with friends . . . they live the best way they can. Now more than ever our students need a helping hand to overcome their homeless-ness due to COVID-19 and their own unusual circumstances.

They have worked hard and achieved much in order to graduate on their own. The gifts they are given are not ordinary gifts. They are **gifts to help them eat**, **live and survive day to day**. This is a very hard life. Some get scholarships but still have a hard time surviving through college or vocational school. Sadly, some don't make it to a better life, and some even drop out just before they graduate.

Once again there will be a graduation party exclusively for them with a photographer to capture the many memories made that day; a guest speaker, Julio Caba (he is wonderful) to motivate them and encourage them to continue; door prizes and a three-course meal provided by Mike's Grill. You can't imagine the smiles on their faces when they walk in the door and see all that has been prepared for them.

You may ask what you can do to help. The citizens of the county have always provided everything they need except food. **With your help we can provide the food items they need**. April 19th is the cut-off date. The luncheon will be in mid-May.

There is a box in the Church office and another in the Narthex for collection of food and supplies. A list of needed items is provided below. It may seem that we are being picky, but the **food must fit into 2-gallon Ziploc freezer bags and quart Ziploc freezer bags**. Cash is always good so we can buy the items that aren't donated.

Housing

Many of you know the story of Junaid Saqib, a member of our congregation who fled Pakistan under the threat of death for being a Christian activist. A Little Bit of Heaven Child Enrichment Center (ALBOH)

This past winter ALBOH underwent a reaccreditation which is good for five years. They are now ready to move forward offering continued exceptional care support for children.

There were a number of small items which were recommended to improve our services. The first is that all our cleaning supplies should be stored within a **locked cabinet**. During Spring cleaning, should you find a large two-door cabinet within the 'back 40' of your garage and want to see it disappear, call the church office.

Additionally, we are looking for a **fire re-sistant filing cabinet** for permanent personnel records. Probably not something you have around the house, but one never knows.

Soffit Repair



Thanks to Leon Rumohr, the church is getting its soffits repaired. You can't see it now, but most of the wood holding up this part of the roof had significant wood rot from water damage.

The replacement wood is actually connected using decking braces rather than being nailed directly into the sill plate. This should improve its longevity.

Once we are able to rent a lift, there is another portion which also requires replacement. This is a time-

consuming task. We are extremely lucky to have someone with the skills, dedication and energy to see this project through.

Audio/Visual Progress Report

We are continuing to enhance our capabilities on the audio/visual front. After a disastrous first attempt to deliver new speakers for the sanctuary (which were damaged in shipment), UPS came through with two new speakers. They have now been installed and are ready for the Easter service. You should notice much improved sound quality in the sanctuary.

We've now received a second camera for use in the sanctuary. Our original plan was to have three mounted cameras to use during our worship services. This one is another point-tiltzoom 30X camera. It has the same field of view as our previous camera, which gives us redundancy should the first camera malfunction. Its location will also give us a different perspective on the service.

The Family Life Center (FLC) now has a drop-down reflective screen which can be used for meetings and videos. This Easter, anticipating larger attendance, we will offer the FLC as an overflow location into which we will simulcast the worship service. We'll

present the service in the FLC through our Facebook livecast using a projector, amplifier and speakers.

Wil has led several virtual trips during the pandemic and has lots to share.

There will be reading to do in advance. First UMC sent a team to serve with CRMP during the summer of 2019. We had two mission trips scheduled with them during 2020, both of which were cancelled because of COVID-19.

TechSoup.org's COVID Recovery Fund

Computerization for non-profits is often costly. Thanks to TechSoup, churches and other non-profits can often get free or discounted software and hardware from major manufacturers. We were blessed with a \$2,000 COVID Recovery Fund grant from TechSoup to purchase equipment in support of our mission.

We have recently purchased a new Dell laptop computer to use in FLC Classrooms 1 and 2 for Zoom meetings and display on our television. This replaced a much older and slower laptop which we had previously installed. Additionally, we have ordered two convertible laptops which can also serve as tablet computers. These are anticipated to be used to control the sanctuary's sound system from outside of the Audio/Video booth, and to permit the pastor to see the Facebook comments which come in each Sunday during the service.

This gift made it possible for us to acquire equipment which we would have otherwise delayed purchasing into future years.

For those of you who may not know, during chapel on Friday, March 12, 2021, we had a shooting on Union Street right in front of the Rosa Valdez playground. This is the second shooting since May in front of the playground.

Both incidents happened in broad daylight while our children were outside. The first incident left bullet casings all along the sidewalk and a bullet lodged in our wrought iron playground fence! In both incidents, our amazing staff acted quickly and no one was physically hurt . . . but the emotional trauma has been building with each incident.

This violence and danger are heart breaking! But . . . we are grateful to God for His protection and to our partners who have offered trauma counseling and support. We are also grateful to law enforcement who have turned their attention toward the safety of our school and seem to be working to do what they can to address the crime in our community.

Usually we give the sale items we can't keep until the next sale to the Salvation Army. Recently the Salvation Army has become more selective in what they will take.



Letter from Bishop Ken Carter

Dear Clergy and Laity of the Florida Annual Conference:

It has been a year since we first asked you to suspend worship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Since then, you have been doing the work of innovation and providing virtual and safe in-person gatherings. We continue to applaud your efforts to provide ministry online and to safely return to in-person activity using the guidelines we have created after discernment with your church leadership. We know every context is different. We continue to promote shared leadership among clergy and laity as you continue to reach the needs of your community.

We know there will come a day when the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention[CDC will make changes in their recommendations for indoor gatherings. Vaccine distribution has increased and positive cases have decreased. The light at the end of this tunnel is getting brighter. Thanks be to God!

We will continue to monitor the latest guidance from the CDC. For now, we ask you to continue to practice these essential guidelines:

1. At all times persons must **maintain at least six feet of distance** between family groups.

2. Masks or cloth face coverings are required when any group gathers (except for children under the age of 2).

3. **Monitor your symptoms**. Stay home if you are sick or displaying COVID-19 symptoms. Those who have tested positive for COVID-19 or have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive should adhere to the CDC guidelines for isolation and quarantine.

4. All inside activities must be in **well ventilated spaces** that allow for persons to maintain at least six feet of distance between family groups. **Outside activities are preferred over inside activities**.

Our COVID-19 safety **protocols** and **guidelines** are connected to the ongoing guidance and recommendations from the **Florida Department of Health** and the **Centers for Disease Control**. Although they have updated their guidance related to persons who have received the vaccine and for schools, their

guidance for gatherings related to churches remains the same. Without knowing the vaccination status of all parishioners, continuing the aforementioned protocols will be the most responsible action.

We encourage local churches to continue the offering of online worship. We pray for patience as some persons return to in-person worship, while others await the vaccine.

We know some of you are beginning to plan summer activities for children and youth. We are pleased that we will be able to host summer camp at Warren Willis Camp this summer as they follow the strict guidance from the American Camping Association. Information about the Warren Willis Camp guidelines can be found <u>here</u> and you can register <u>here</u>. Your church should plan to follow similar guidelines as you plan your summer.

All of our previous <u>updates</u> and resources are found on our <u>COVID-19 website and in our FAQ</u> <u>section</u>. If you have questions or we can help interpret these guidelines, please reach out to your District Superintendent or contact the Episcopal Office at <u>ashanks@flumc.org</u>.

We appreciate your perseverance. We are a people of hope who continue to press on as we remain On Mission Together.



Black Clergywomen Share Challenges, Rewards in New Book

"Pioneer Black Clergywomen: Stories of Black Clergywomen of the United Methodist Church 1974 -2016," written by Josephine Whitely-Fields, includes stories from Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi, the Rev. Tara Sutton and more.

When Bishop Linda Lee started work in the Wisconsin Conference in 2004, she noticed that she got a lot of unsolicited advice about the administrative duties of her new position. The strange thing was, most of the advice-givers had never been a bishop. She already had held the position in the Michigan Conference.

"I became aware of the fact that some people were of the mindset that being spiritual and Black could not be equated with good administration," Lee said. The anecdote is one of many in "<u>Pioneer Black</u> <u>Clergywomen: Stories of Black Clergywomen of the United Methodist Church 1974-2016</u>" that lays out the frustrations, challenges and rewards during the careers of nine Black United Methodist clergywomen.

The book was written by the Rev. Josephine Whitely-Fields, who retired in 2014 after more than 40 years as a pastor, seminary professor and administrator. She also is one of the subjects of the book, which uses a questionnaire format to let the women speak for themselves.

"Some of our ladies have been attacked physically," Whitely-Fields said. "We have also been sexually harassed." Some people believe no women of any race should be in the ministry, she said.

"There are people who identify with the pastor as a representative of Christ, and because Christ was male, then they feel that a female cannot adequately be the spiritual representative," Whitely-Fields said. Her answer: "Our call didn't come from man. Our call came from God. Therefore, you or nobody else can tell me that I cannot answer the call to ministry." The Rev. Sallie Crenshaw was the <u>first Black woman ordained</u> in The Methodist Church in 1958. It took until 1984 for the first Black woman bishop, Bishop Leontine T.C. Kelly, to be appointed in The United Methodist Church.

With financial help from the United Methodist Commission on Archives and History and United Methodist Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Whitely-Fields sought Black clergywomen willing to tell their stories. Twenty-three agreed, nine of whom are included in the book.

In addition to Lee and Whitely-Fields, the profiles include Western Pennsylvania Conference Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi, the Rev. Cheryl Bell, the Rev. Ella DeDeaux, Virginia Conference Bishop Sharma Lewis, East Ohio Conference Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, the Rev. Edna Morgan and the Rev. Tara Sutton.

Especially in the earlier days of Black clergywomen, there were appointments to small, isolated churches, some on the way to closure. There were also pay disparities.

On the other hand though, once we get past those initial barriers, people respond to us in a different way because they are able to identify with us as women to women," Whitely-Fields said. "Because the majority of the people in the church are women, and when they find a woman that is sensitive and compassionate, they begin to gravitate and can become our greatest supporters."

Proceeds from the book will benefit scholarships for Black clergywomen.

Planned Denomination Gets Name

Traditionalists committed to leaving The United Methodist Church have chosen "**Global Methodist Church**" as the name for the denomination they plan to launch. The group also unveiled on March 1 a logo and <u>website</u>. The work toward a new denomination is guided by a transitional leadership council, which includes some retired United Methodist bishops.

"The primary mission of the Global Methodist Church will be to make disciples of Jesus Christ who worship passionately, love extravagantly and witness boldly," said the Rev. Keith Boyette, chair of the transitional leadership council.

But the official start and legal organization of the Global Methodist Church may well be more than a year and a half away. Boyette and other leaders are counting on passage of the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation, <u>a plan negotiated by centrist</u>, <u>progressive and traditionalist United</u> <u>Methodist leaders</u> to end the denomination's longstanding conflict over how accepting to be of homosexuality. The protocol would let traditionalist churches and even annual conferences vote to leave and form another denomination, with \$25 million to start. However, the protocol requires approval by General Conference, The United Methodist Church's global lawmaking assembly.

The 2020 General Conference was delayed for a year because of the COVID-19 pandemic and <u>has been postponed again</u> — until Aug. 29-Sept. 6, 2022 — because the public health emergency continues. A special one-day, online General Conference has been called by the Council of Bishops for May 8, but it's only to deal with 12 legislative items whose passage will help the denomination carry on administratively until a full General Conference can happen. The protocol is not on the limited agenda for May 8.


"We're proceeding according to plan, which is we would legally form and operationalize the Global Methodist Church upon adoption of the implementation legislation for the protocol," Boyette said by phone. He added that if, in the meantime, there's erosion of support for the protocol among those who negotiated it, the Global Methodist Church will consider going ahead with an official launch.

Boyette said he has seen no such wavering. He noted that the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) — which advocates for full inclusion of LGBTQ persons in The United Methodist Church, and whose executive director, Jan Lawrence, was on the protocol negotiating team — reiterated support for the protocol <u>in a recent statement</u>. The RMN statement also expressed support for the <u>Christmas Covenant</u>, a restructuring plan for The United Methodist Church that allows for more regional policymaking.

For decades, The United Methodist Church has faced conflict over same-sex weddings and the ordination of "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy. Church law bans both those practices, but there has been widespread defiance in churches and conferences in the U.S. and western Europe.

The 2019 special General Conference in St. Louis saw a major effort to pass legislation allowing more local church control on LGBTQ inclusion, but <u>delegates reinforced the current bans</u> in a meeting whose levels of conflict, protest and emotion drew national media coverage.

Traditionalists have long maintained that the denomination's sexuality divide can't be overcome. The Wesleyan Covenant Association (WCA), led by Boyette, <u>formed in 2016</u> and has been planning for a new denomination. Boyette said the WCA will continue to exist even though the Global Methodist Church has a name, logo and transitional leadership council.

"I've often described (the WCA) as a midwife to bring to birth a new denomination. We will continue to pursue that objective," Boyette said. "Our expectation is that once the Global Methodist Church is functioning and has its convening conference, the Wesleyan Covenant Association will have fulfilled its mission."

The name "Global Methodist Church" is in the spirit of Methodism founder John Wesley's statement "The world is my parish," a press release said. The logo brings together circles representing the Trinity, with the cross in the center. "As a whole, the logo communicates God's sending of the church into the world," the press release said. "The sky-blue color reminds us that even though Global Methodists live all around the world, they are united together in God's great creation."

The transitional leadership council includes retired Bishops Lindsey Davis and Robert Hayes of the U.S., and retired Bishop John Innis, who led the Liberia Conference. "I am convinced the Global Methodist Church will be a vibrant, vital expression of Methodism in terms of its teaching and ethics," Hayes said in a press release.

The Rev. Philippe Adjobi, a district superintendent in the Côte d'Ivoire Conference, and the Rev. Andrei Kim, a district superintendent in the North West Russia and Belarus Conference, are among the other members. "I believe the Global Methodist Church will fulfill the expectations and aspirations of local churches throughout Africa," Adjobi said in materials provided by the traditionalist group.

But some United Methodists in Africa are strongly opposed to a breakup of The United Methodist Church, and a <u>variety of voices continue to weigh in</u> about the denomination's future. Boyette said traditionalist advocacy groups in The United Methodist Church, including Good News, submitted nominees for the transitional council. Another group of traditional leaders met in Atlanta about a year ago to cast a vision for the new denomination, and the group recently met virtually, calling for passage of the protocol as soon as possible.

That group includes active bishops, but Boyette said he "can't speak for them" as to whether they would leave The United Methodist Church for the Global Methodist Church. Nor would Boyette estimate how many churches will be a part of the Global Methodist Church at its launch. The group has a "Transitional Book of Doctrines and Discipline," available in English, French, Korean, Portuguese and Spanish, but various organizational and operational details remain to be worked out.

"True to our roots, we're a patient and methodical people," Boyette said. Late last year a group of progressive United Methodists <u>launched a new denomination</u> called Liberation Methodist Connexion, or LMX. 

Thursday, March 12, 2021 - Paulette Rolle-Alesnik, Lesley Kristine and Ms. Debbie, Continued






Friday, March 19, 2021 - Debbie Miller, Paulette Rolle-Alesnik and PRA Int'l


