From the Pastor

Penny and I love the mountains. Our favorites are the Great Smoky Mountains, but we have also been to and appreciate the Rockies, the Grand Tetons, the Clark and the Lewis ranges in Glacier National Park and the Alaska Range with Mt. Denali. They are all special in their own way. Flying over and around these mountains is breath taking and awe inspiring, but driving through them and observing them from overlooks and scenic vistas bring them closer to you.

When you get out of the car and begin to explore them for yourself, when you hike the trails and feel the muscle burn from the climb, when you bend over and touch the cool mountain stream, when you can smell the fir scent in the air, feel the cool breeze on you face and just stand and stare at the vast array of color spread across the vista in the autumn . . . they grab you and won't let go.

When you are in the mountains and have to stop to allow the bighorn sheep herd to cross the trail, you feel like you are touching nature itself, or when you sit on the side of the mountain watching a mother bear and her cubs on the ridge below you, then you reflect on the beauty around you, but also you are aware of the danger that may be present. The experiences you share make these mountains a reality in your life. It is then that often they become a part of you and constantly call your name and beckon you to return; at least they did us.

This is a lot like our relationship to God and our faith. It is one thing to know about God from writings we may have read, like the Bible. It is another thing to know about him from the stories others have told you about what they may have seen or felt. To attend a church service or event or watch one on Facebook or YouTube is one thing, but God and Christianity are still just head knowledge for a person in those instances. God may be an awe-inspiring Deity, but you don't really know him.

It is only when we can walk with Him, talk with Him, when we feel Him in our lives, that He becomes real – like our mountain experiences. It is that moment when we truly experience God for ourselves that we become real, live Christians – knowing beyond a shadow of doubt God not only exists, but also is there for you.

It is that moment that changes you forever, and from that day forward God is constantly calling your name, inviting you into His presence and urging you to speak with and worship Him. You ask how can I experience God in this way? Get out of the car; step into life with God. Ask Him to be present in your life, and expect Him to show up. In John 10:27 Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice, I know them and they follow me." This Scripture makes Jesus present with us, the sheep and the shepherd have experiences together and call to each other.

Can you hear Jesus or is the noise of this world too loud? Stop the car, get out and listen. Stop everything and sit in His presence. God has promised to never leave nor forsake his children. He said this in Proverbs 8:17: I love those who love me, and those who seek me diligently find me.

He is here and ready to speak to you. He is calling your name even now. May your spiritual eyes and ears be open to the Lord's call.

May 30th is Peace with Justice Sunday

One of our denomination's six *Special Sundays with offering*, Peace with Justice Sunday (PWJS) is a faithful expression of shalom in the Bible. It calls the church to strengthen its capacity to advocate publicly in communities and nations throughout the world. Half of our gifts stay with local ministries in this conference and half support the work of the General Board of Church and Society globally. Together we strengthen God's family with ministries that challenge structures of inequality and empower people and communities through systemic change. Please note **PWJS** on your donation.

Some examples of programs funded by PWJS in the United States:

A grant to Seabold United Methodist Church in Bainbridge Island, WA, helped support the needs of members with intellectual disabilities who were part of the Island Time Activities program.

The Summer Arts Camp of United Methodist Church of the Redeemer, in Temple Hills, MD, used a PWJ Sunday grant which, in partnership with Leaders of Tomorrow Youth Center, supported a program to help children unleash their creative abilities through a variety of artistic expressions including drama, music, dance, visual arts and photography.

To help address a long litany of violence in the community, Hughes UMC joined with Howard University School of Law to begin an after-school program to help at-risk children and youth who live in the community surrounding the church. The District of Columbia Public School system "has historically been defined by sometimes stark racial and class divides. Poverty, food insecurity, housing insecurity and rampant violence are just some of the factors that negatively impact the academic performance of the children who live near Hughes Memorial UMC," the Rev. Paul Johnson said. "It is unfair and unrealistic to expect impoverished children who are hungry, cold and scared to excel in school."

Subtle Signs of Early Symptoms of Dementia

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) defines dementia as a "general term for the impaired ability to remember, think, or make decisions that interferes with doing everyday activities." Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia.

One of the myths about memory loss is that it is a part of normal aging. This is not true and often people experiencing early signs of dementia miss out on early interventions that can begin with a proper diagnosis. Often, the family member is aware of the memory issues and will compensate with humor or "catchphrases" and the diagnosis is missed or delayed.

Below are some early signs that could warrant a dementia screening:

• Difficulty with short-term memory. Your family member cannot recall what he/she ate for breakfast for example.

- Difficulty with attention and focus.
- Challenges with communication.
- Changes in reasoning, judgment, and problem-solving.
- Changes in visual perception beyond age-related changes in vision.
- Getting lost in a familiar neighborhood, either walking or driving.
- Difficulty finding words or using unusual words to refer to something.
- Requiring more assistance with daily activities.
- Not dressing in clean clothes because a stain is overlooked.
- Forgetting the name of a close family member.
- Uses "catchphrases" for most questions such as "Everything is great" or "I am just fine."
- Changes in mood such as depression.
- Lack of motivation or losing interest in activities or hobbies.
- Confusion or a change in social skills when interacting with people.
- Difficulty in following a conversation or television program.
- Being repetitive with stories or asking the same question over and over.
- Difficulty with operating the microwave or television remote.

If you begin to notice subtle changes in a friend or loved one, a visit to the doctor would be a good option for a proper assessment.

Paraphrase of Psalm 23 Lisa Buffam

We may need a Good Shepherd today as much as any other time in history. Here, I offer my own simple paraphrase of Psalm 23 for today:

UMC and Marianna Business Owners Team Up to Provide Housing

An UMCOR Success Story

Business owners in the Marianna area have joined forces to make home ownership a reality for several families displaced by Hurricane Michael. "In Marianna, we are up to 11 brand-new houses," said the Rev. Chris Ackerman, director of Hurricane Michael Recovery for the AWFUMC. "It's been a really awesome opportunity."

The building effort - which targeted uninsured and under-insured residents - is one small piece of the long-term recovery program made possible by the **United Methodist Committee on Relief's \$4.6 million grant awarded to the Alabama-West Florida United Methodist Conference in 2019.** The recovery fund was launched in direct response to

Hurricane Michael, a category 5 storm that caused an estimat-

ed \$25 billion in damages across Northwest Florida.

Ackerman said the program's success in Marianna is largely due to the determination and ingenuity of Al Gilbertson, the team's construction coordinator who's "got a huge heart. What he did was he went around the Marianna area and he started reaching out to all the contractors - the plumbing contractors, electrical contractors, framers, all of that - and he basically talked all of them into providing their services at cost," Ackerman said. "And he was able to talk them into it because they wanted to help their community. That's the beautiful story!"

Ackerman . . . said the quality of the work provided by the businesses has surpassed all of his expectations. Ultimately, each of the houses was built for \$50,000 to \$60,000. "It's a testament to small-town communities where people know their neighbors and living in their community means something to them," he said. "And the houses we're building will be able to be handed down to the next generation or sold to the next family."

The final six of the 11 Marianna houses - which were built on the residents' original properties - are on track to be finished by the end of May. They are among a total of 40 new houses built by the recovery program across the affected area including Gulf, Jackson and Bay counties. "Scripture talks about us all being part of the body and it takes all of those pieces coming together to function," Ackerman said. "Seeing God bring all those pieces together is really powerful. It's God working through everyday people. It's God using everybody."

As for Gilbertson, he doesn't want to stop. "I wish I had a couple million dollars more because I'd like to build about seven more homes. There are still thousands of people in need."
