From the Pastor

I was at the hospital very early last week to be with someone having surgery and I left there right at daybreak. I drove around Lake Parker as I often do just to observe nature – to catch a breath and calm me down. The sun was just coming up, the sky was blue and the lake was still. The sun was peeking over the horizon and as it did the light from it formed a bright cross. It was absolutely breath taking.

I was reflecting on how God broke into the lives of his people and brought them salvation, healing and freedom from sin when suddenly, a black plume of smoke appeared between me and the sun. The power plant had just belched out a cloud of smoke ruining my perfect picture. Aaaaahhhh. How dare it! Yet, isn't that what happens in life too? We think we are doing so well, worship is great, things are looking up, and then suddenly a problem occurs like COVID or an air conditioning unit goes out, or the sound tech gets sick.

Personally, we think things are good when we suddenly, unexpectedly, fall and mess up by repeating a rumor, or we allow hatred and rage to come out in our words and actions, or someone comes against us with an unfounded and false accusation. Our view of God, the church or our fellow Christian is tainted and we lose sight of Jesus – like the black cloud obscuring my view of a gorgeous sunrise. How can we restore that view we had at first?

That particular morning it took just about 30 seconds and the smoke dissipated, restoring the awesome sunrise scene. In real life in order to remove the darkness it may take longer than 30 seconds, but we need to refocus on Jesus. We may have to confess our part of the wrongdoing and ask for forgiveness from God and possibly also from our fellow man. It would be a help to search the Scriptures and apply them to the situation and to pray for God not only to guide us in this, but also to intervene in the situation.

God's will is for us to be at peace as much as possible with one another. We find this in Scripture: **How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!** (Psalm 133:1, NIV)

I have found it is easier to be at peace when I am right with God and trust him in every situation. Somehow things are not as bad when Jesus is in the picture. Within the resurrection of Jesus there is a hope and an expectancy that God will work miracles, do the impossible and create new beings of his followers. Focus on God and trust Him only.

## Letter from Bishop Carter on COVID-19

UPDATE: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated their mask guidance for fully vaccinated people on July 27th. They now recommend : **To maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an area of substantial or high transmission.** [That means US! Editor]

Dear Florida Conference Clergy and Laity:

We continue to pray for you as you navigate this season. We had all hoped we would be through this pandemic by now, but we clearly are not.

Like you, the conference is monitoring the increase in new COVID-19 cases and the concerns around the Delta variant and its rapid spread, especially among those who are unvaccinated. We understand that although Florida represents only 6% of the US population, it also represents 20% of the new cases being reported. (source links: <u>ABCActionNews</u> and <u>CBSMiami</u>).

We invite you to continue to do what you have been doing. Lean into this next season of the pandemic, being aware that we are living in an in-between time that requires hybrid ministry at every level.

In this regard, we invite you to continue to follow the <u>guidance we offered on May 14th</u>, which is directly connected to the <u>CDC updated guidance from May 13th</u>:

1. Encourage unvaccinated people to wear masks while indoors. Mask wearing is optional for those who have been fully vaccinated [Editor]. Fully vaccinated is defined as being two weeks after the last dose of the vaccine.

2. Extend grace to one another. Be sensitive to children under 12 years old who are not old enough to be vaccinated and those who are unable to be vaccinated because they are immune compromised. Adults who are fully vaccinated who have children or grandchildren or vulnerable persons in their household may choose to wear a mask. For this reason, some churches may choose to require masks for everyone.

3. Making masks optional requires trust. Churches should consider providing caution zones where people who want to wear masks can do so. [Editor]

4. We continue to encourage people to maintain social distance and use sanitizers.

5. Continue to work as a team to monitor your local context and consult with your local health department and the CDC about the specifics to your context.

Finally, we know some of you are preparing for the opening of pre-schools later this summer. Our recommendations around pre-schools remain connected to the <u>CDC guidelines</u> (July 9th update) and the guidelines of your local context. Most pre-schools working with children who are all unable to be vaccinated due to their age require masks for children (over two years old) along with the adults who are volunteering or working with them.

## A New Adventure for Lake Gibson UMC – Reaching the Next Generation

In Matthew 9:37- 38 (NIV) Jesus tells us "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field". God's church was created for something great. That something great is His mandate to reach people with the word of God, His true love and the blessings He has for them and for us.

We cannot reach what we cannot see, but if we open our eyes and look around, and not away, we will find that the harvest is plentiful. At times I have to ask myself "If God answered all my prayers, would it change the world or just change me?" As I get older I become more aware that our generation now has a shorter time to make it happen.

Some of us have spent a fair amount of time asking these questions, "How do we reach the next generation? What are Millennials looking for in a church? How can we attract them and make them a part of it?" The conclusion is we need to use social media and technology to reach people for Jesus, to reach the next generations. Last week we spent some time looking at a system that we believe will help us accomplish our purpose. Here's an outline of the system design:

- Create an Engagement Pathway with the goal of online ministry conversations.
- Introduce people to our church and our mission.
- Design to build personal connection with new visitors before they show up on a Sunday,

- Work with the expectation that people will start getting saved and an overflow of people visiting our church.

This program comes with templates for creating ads for Facebook and Instagram, built-in follow-up encouraging them to come over a period of time, and 60 days of support in setting up the system and coaching us for success.

As we work toward these goals and expectations, we fully understand and believe these efforts will only be successful with your daily prayers and support, with a desire to see God build His church in our midst. Over time we will be sharing results and more information of the workings of this system as we go forward.

<sup>7</sup> Therefore, LORD, we know you will protect the oppressed, preserving them forever from this lying generation,

<sup>8</sup> even though the wicked strut about, and evil is praised throughout the land." (NLT)

Is this not prophetic for a time such as this? We in the church should be even more aware of where we are headed than those in the secular world because they have no foundation in the truth of Father GOD, and we need to pray for them daily for the truth to enter in and set them free from bondage.



## Results of the Poll on Sanctuary Seating and Lighting

The Church Council asked the congregation in July to advise them on preferences for Sanctuary seating and lighting. Sixty-eight ballots were received. The results are as follows: <u>Seating</u>: Chairs only - 21 votes; Pews only - 17; Mix of chairs and pews - 30. <u>Lighting</u>: Recessed (to replace pendants) - 55 votes; Repair existing pendants - 11. The Council will continue to study the proposed changes.


We also need more paper grocery bags. Please bring your used bags to the church office when you can. Thank you.

**Disciple 1 Online for Mulvane UMC in Kansas and Anyone** (**DBS 125**) - Thursday nights beginning August 12, led by Joe Warne. <u>Click here for more information</u>. Course fee: \$35.00. This study is offered for anyone, anywhere, unchurched or churched people, college age or older. Participants will covenant together to study the scripture faithfully for the duration of the course (34 weeks) and participate in weekly Zoom meetings. The weekly Zoom sessions will be on **Thursday at 8:00 pm Eastern Daylight Time (EDT)**. The **orientation meeting will be on Thursday,12 August 2021 at 8:00 pm EDT via Zoom**.

The weekly Zoom sessions will be on **Wednesday** (7:00-8:30 pm EDT). The orientation meeting will be on **Wednesday, August 18, 2021, at 7:00 pm EDT**. Uses same Disciple 1 study manual as above class.

**Disciple 2 Online for Soapstone UMC in Raleigh, NC and Anyone (DBS 224)**, Sundays beginning **September 12**, led by Bill Poston. <u>Click here for more information</u>. The Disciple 2 Bible Study manual (<u>Disciple 2 Into the Word, Into the World</u>) is approximately \$35-40 and must be ordered separately from enrollment. Using the manual as a guide, learners will find and reflect on 30-minute daily readings for 32 weeks. You will then go online for videos of Bible scholars discussing the weekly scripture passages and to use the online Discussion Board to share views on what you are reading and hearing, as well as prayer requests and mutual support and encouragement. The group will gather in weekly 70-minute Zoom meetings. The sessions will be on Sundays at 2:30 pm EDT. The orientation meeting will be on Sunday, September 12 at 2:30 pm EDT. Course Fee is \$30, which covers the online assignments, support for the software, and access to the videos.

Additional Requirements for all three courses: High speed internet access, a computer with an internal or external camera with microphone, a study Bible, the course study manual, and an adventurous spirit and desire to study the Bible in a new way!

These three groups are forming now and will begin soon. **Disciple is a big** [time] **commitment**, but it is also a **transformative experience** for Christians at any level of development.

## Creation Care: Facts about Plastic



First discovered in the 1950's, nine billion metric tons have been produced since then, and only 20–30% of it is still in use, meaning that the

rest is waste still on this earth in some form.

Plastic is made of petroleum and uses huge amounts of water in the production of plastic pellets that are sold to manufacturers all over the world.

The vast majority of plastic waste ends up in landfills and oceans, where it degrades into microplastics, which then invade the human food chain through fish and other marine animals that have ingested them, and through tap water. Microplastics can enter the bloodstream, the lymphatic system, and the liver.

The first recycling programs were started by the plastics industry as part of a strategy to encourage companies and families to use more plastic.

At best, only 9% of all plastic is recycled, and it takes 100–500 years for plastic to disintegrate in nature. What doesn't disintegrate is burned, releasing toxic fumes into the atmosphere.

The largest contributor of plastic in landfills today is thrown away clothing—think spandex and polyester!

Now that the demand for petroleum fuel and energy is declining, the industry is focusing more on producing plastic packaging. Currently, Coca-Cola and Amazon are the highest users of plastic packaging.

The United States is responsible for 33% of the world's refuse.

## Does The UMC Fund These Non-related Entities?

Advocacy groups (such as Good News, Institute on Religion and Democracy, Methodist Federation for Social Action, Reconciling Ministries Network, The Confessing Movement): No. These are independent organizations funded by their members and participants.

**Black Lives Matter organizations: No.** The United Methodist Church addresses anti-racism work primarily through the <u>General Commission on Religion and Race</u> and annual conference commissions on religion and race. The apportionment your congregation sends to your annual conference funds both your annual conference commission on religion and race and the General Commission. The denominational budget funds no Black Lives Matter organizations.

March of Dimes: No. The United Methodist Church has never funded this organization.

**World Vision and Samaritan's Purse: No to both.** The United Methodist Church has never funded these organizations.

**National Council(s) of Churches (and similar ecumenical bodies outside the US): Yes.** The United Methodist Church, through its predecessor bodies, was a founding member of the <u>National</u> <u>Council of Churches</u> and its predecessor, the Federal Council of Churches. The ecumenical commitment of The UMC, however, extends beyond the United States, and includes a financial commitment to support these bodies that bring Christians of many denominations together in common efforts. See page 35 of the <u>Financial Commitment Booklet</u> to learn more, and page 38 to find out how much funding can go annually to support these organizations when 100% of apportionments are paid.

Planned Parenthood: No. The United Methodist Church has never funded this organization.

**Political Parties or Political Candidates: No.** The United Methodist Church does not fund political candidates or political parties. This is a prohibited activity under U.S. non-profit law for churches and other charitable organizations which qualify for exemption from federal income tax. Churches may jeopardize or even lose this status if they engage in "political campaign activity." Learn more about the <u>Church's involve-</u> <u>ment in politics</u>.

**Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice:** Not as of 2017. The United Methodist Church was a founding member of this coalition and advocated for the Church's life-centered position on abortion in dialogue with other member bodies, many of whom hold choice-centered ethics. The 2016 General Conference instructed The UMC to exit the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice and eliminate all funding for it.

**World Council of Churches: Yes.** The United Methodist Church, the largest Protestant denomination that functions as a worldwide church, is committed to witnessing to the gospel and extending the mission of Christ in partnership with Christian bodies on a worldwide basis. As a founding member of The <u>World</u> <u>Council of Churches</u> through its predecessor bodies, The United Methodist Church continues its presence, witness, and collaborative work in the World Council of Churches through the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, one of the apportioned funds. United Methodist funding supports the participation of United Methodists and Christians of many denominations from developing countries in the worldwide assemblies of the Council, as well as the Council's ongoing work of promoting initiatives to build justice and make for peace. ## Stepping into Your Loved-One's Reality: Is It Lying or Compassion?

Who doesn't enjoy being surrounded by people who make you feel understood and supported? The need to be validated is important to everyone, especially to those living with memory loss. But so often, care partners, friends, family, and even professionals who support people living with dementia or Alzheimer's disease lack the understanding of the importance of recognizing that people with memory loss have thoughts, feelings, concerns, and wishes that need to be understood and validated.

At one time, "reality orientation" was the most common form of communicating with people living with dementia. The purpose of reality orientation is to disrupt cognitive decline by stimulating the confused individual by reinforcing name, date, time, and other facts. Trying to orient a person with significant memory loss is asking the person to do something they are not capable of. Early on, "nursing homes" used colorful calendars and large clocks in each room so every time staff or family member entered the room, the person was prompted to be "grounded" in reality. Unfortunately, this only caused distress and behavioral symptoms, as the person was really being asked to be in our reality. This still happens today with family members or caregivers who do not understand the importance of entering their reality, and arguments are constant.

In the very early stage of memory loss, gentle reminders of the day of the week (reality orientation) can be helpful, but once the person becomes more confused and disoriented and believes and argues that it is Wednesday when it is Friday, validating their reality and redirecting works best.

"Validation therapy" is a proven, non-pharmaceutical method of communication developed by American social worker and gerontologist Naomi Feil. She was born in Germany, and her parents came to the US, and she said she "was raised in a home for the aged," where both parents held administrative positions. She recognized even as a child that taking a more empathetic approach when communicating with the more confused residents kept them calmer and happier. Using validation therapy is a much kinder and more effective way to communicate and causes less stress and anxiety for everyone

But is it lying? Many family members and friends feel being untruthful is wrong and they continue to correct, scold and argue with their family member, repeatedly asking them "why can't you remember it is 2021 not 1941?" Trying to convince a person with cognitive decline who claims "Christmas is coming" and correcting them that it is February and we just had Christmas, only confuses, frustrates them and results in arguments and conflicts. Using the outdated method to keep people in 'reality' is especially difficult for the person when he/she is told of a death of someone they love. For example, confronting a family member who can't remember the death of their mother 30 years ago each time they ask "when is mother coming to visit," is harmful to the person. "Reminding" the person that their mother is dead over and over is not help-ful because hearing the news of the death is always hearing it for a first time, and grief can be overwhelming.

So, is being "in the moment" with your family member and providing comfort and security by validating their feelings really lying, or is it just showing compassion? The next time you are tempted to argue, "remind" or correct inaccurate comments from your loved-one such as when he/she is thinking Christmas is around the corner, ask yourself if is more important for you to be correct and tell them it is February, or validate how much you both love Christmas and just "go with the flow." Joining them in their reality can be a caring and joyful moment to share.

The introduction of the article reads "Caring for and loving one another as we live into our diversity as a denomination are pillars of The United Methodist Church. The long-running conversation about sexuality often has created dissension and pain, so how we show Christ's love to each other in the midst of the conversation is significant. For those interested in educating themselves with a variety of viewpoints and seeking to create a space for understanding, we offer this collection of books written by United Methodist leaders and laypersons."

### "Science, Scripture and Same-Sex Love"

Author Michael B. Regele challenges the premise of some church leaders who assert that same-sex practices are incompatible with Christian teaching. Regele explores current scientific findings in biological brain research, psychology and sociology, which he compares with scriptural teaching from the Bible, to show that a faithful reading of the Scriptures is consistent with Christian teaching that affirms same-sex love leading to same-sex marriage and full participation of LGBT people in church leadership.

### "Our Lives Matter: A Womanist Queer Theology"

Pamela R. Lightsey, United Methodist clergy and author, explores the impact of multiple oppressions experienced by Black Queer women. The book explores liberation theologies to reflect on LGBTQIA+ issues in the Church such as marriage and ordination rights.

### "For the Body"

Timothy Tennett, President of Asbury Theological Seminary and author, looks at what it means to be created in the image of God and how our bodies serve as icons that illuminate God's purposes. Tennent examines topics like marriage, family, singleness and friendship, and he looks at how the human body has been objectified in art and media today. He also offers a framework for discipling people today in a Christian theology of the body.

### "Our Strangely Warmed Hearts: Coming Out Into God's Call"

As John Wesley discovered his true spiritual identify, he experienced a strangely warmed heart. Karen P. Oliveto, United Methodist bishop and author, shares poignant stories and well-reasoned principles to disclose why and how spiritual renewal and a personal call to ministry emerge in the strangely warmed hearts of lesbian and gay Christians.

## "Reclaiming Church: A Call to Action for Religious Rejects"

United Methodist J.J. Warren, a seminary student, continues his call to reaffirm that the Church be welcoming to all, including young queer people. The book focuses on practical and positive steps for joining voices, being heard, building bridges, and working together for young people to reclaim Church in their lives.

### "When Christians Get It Wrong"

Adam Hamilton, United Methodist pastor and author, examines why young adults increasingly are opting out of Christianity and the church. Christians are the reason, Hamilton writes. When young adults talk about the problems they have with Christianity and the church, they often name certain attitudes and behaviors they believe are practiced too often by Christians: judging others, condemning people of other faiths, rejecting science, injecting politics into faith, and being anti-homosexual. Hamilton addresses the issues and how and why Christians can get it right when it comes to being Christ in the world.
